

Minutes of the Regular Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Williamsville held in the Municipal Building, Williamsville, New York on Monday, April 10, 1978 at 7:30 P.M.

Mayor Sheffer called the meeting to order at 7:30 P.M.

Mayor Sheffer welcomed back Trustee Kuzon and newly elected Trustee Rosemarie Sugg. Village Justice Charles H. Dougherty gave the oath of office to Trustee Kuzon and Trustee Sugg.

Mayor Sheffer stated he felt it was worthwhile for the Mayor to annually report to the Board and the public as to the condition of the municipality. He said the state of the Village is very strong. First rate services are being provided while the Village taxpayers enjoy the second lowest tax rate in the county. We have a Class A bond rating. We have attempted to increase the participation by the residents and to improve the fiscal responsibility of the Trustees. He stated that local government must withstand the outside pressures from the federal and state governments.

In his State of the Village message the Mayor also addressed the proposed closing of Academy School. The impact of this proposal is not at all limited to Academy families. It will have a negative impact on Forest as well as the other schools. One point against the closing is the proposed development of the Farber-Jacobs property as residential homes. This would bring many new families into the neighborhood of Academy School. He stated that whether or not he is appointed to the Task Force investigating the proposal, he will continue to fight against the closing and he asked that other members of the community do so too.

Mayor's State of the
Village
Message

The Mayor stated there are many matters facing us in the coming year. One is the improvement of the traffic and parking situation on Main Street. The proposed Youngs Road extension would help in this area. The Board, the Traffic and Safety Committee and the Planning Board are all involved in considering methods to improve this situation. Possible sites for a low level parking ramp and possible sources of funding are currently under consideration. As long as there are federal and state grants, the Village will take advantage of them.

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Mayor Sheffer stated many projects have been developed during the past year, including Glen Park, the senior citizens housing, obtaining the Christian Church for use as the Village Meeting House and the Comprehensive Planning Study.

The Mayor stated that the projected cost of sewers and sewage treatment remains the most important issue facing the Village and will remain so in the future. We must face these costs and we must plan ahead and consider all the alternatives.

The Mayor stated that not only the elected officials but the Department of Public Works and the office staff are available to help our residents and they should feel free to take advantage of them.

ON MOTION by Trustee Kuzon, seconded by Trustee Walker, the minutes of the regular meeting held March 27, 1978 were approved.

Unanimously carried.

ON MOTION by Trustee Walker, seconded by Trustee Sugg, the minutes of the public hearing held March 27, 1978 regarding the proposed use of Federal Revenue Sharing Funds were approved.

Unanimously carried.

ON MOTION by Trustee Kuzon, seconded by Trustee Walker, the minutes of the Reorganization Meeting held April 3, 1978 were approved with the correction that on the Glen Park appointments, the terms of Robert Rowe and Jo Anne MacKay should be until the end of the 1980-1981 official year.

Unanimously carried.

ON MOTION by Trustee Walker, seconded by Trustee Kuzon, it was moved to suspend the rules at 7:45 P.M. in order to hold a public hearing on the 1978-79 General Fund, Water Fund and Sewer Fund Budgets for the Village. The hearing was closed at 8:07 P.M.

Unanimously carried.

ON MOTION by Trustee Walker, seconded by Trustee Kuzon, it was moved to suspend the rules at 8:07 P.M. in order to hold a public hearing on the proposed use of the 1978-79 Federal Revenue Sharing Funds. The hearing was closed at 8:22 P.M.

Unanimously carried.

Mayor Sheffer thanked all the people who have served on our Village committees during the past year. Many are willing to serve this coming year and we appreciate their interest. Some committee appointments were made at the reorganization meeting on April 3rd and some will be made tonight. There are some spots open on

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the Youth and Environmental Committees. Anyone interested in serving on these committees can contact Trustee Sugg for the Youth Committee and Trustee Kuzon for the Environmental Commission.

Mayor Sheffer stated that last year at this time he had requested that all the Trustees submit an accounting or report for the year concerning their various areas of responsibility and what was done and their recommendations for the coming year. He again made the request that they do this for the next year and submit them in February, 1979. Not all submitted a report this year and he stated he has no authority to make them do this. He stated he believes this is a reasonable request to make of a Trustee.

He stated there was a great deal of interest in serving on this committee both from present members who wish to serve again and from others interested in serving and he is recommending the membership be increased to 10 members to accomodate some of them. He stated all terms are for three years.

Mayor Sheffer stated his third resolution deals with calling for a public hearing on a local law which would establish sewer rents. The Trustees, of course, have not as yet made a decision on whether the sewer rents will be segregated from the general fund. This is simply to provide for a public hearing in the event they decide to do this and it will save time. If the sewer charges are not segregated, the public hearing would be superfluous and would be ignored.

ON MOTION by Mayor Sheffer, seconded by Trustee Miller, the following resolution was adopted:

Mayor Sheffer stated the next regular meeting will be on April 24th at 7:30 P.M. At the reorganization meeting we established the 2nd and 4th Mondays of each month for our regular meetings and they will be held at 7:30 P.M.

Trustee Kuzon reported that at the reorganization meeting three members were reappointed to the Planning Board - Mr. Buyer, Mr. Delo and Mr. Wolf.

With respect to the planning study, Trustee Kuzon advised that the Planning Board had narrowed the planning consultants field and were currently obtaining estimates from them regarding the work they feel is necessary. Some of the topics covered in the study will be mapping of Main Street, strip photos, historical preservation code and architectural design study. He stated we will be having another public hearing regarding the study, probably in May.

Trustee Kuzon stated his first resolution dealt with appointments to the Traffic & Safety Committee. Five members need to be appointed. Four will be appointed tonight and they are all present members of

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the committee. One vacancy will exist and they have requested it be filled by a member of the Police Department. We have contacted the department about this.

Trustee Kuzon stated his next resolution on the agenda regarding an appointment to the Board of Appeals will be tabled tonight.

Trustee Miller stated his first resolution deals with the appointment of Village Engineers and assistant Building and Plumbing Inspectors. We have operated for the past few months this way and is more or less a contract than in the past. This is intended to take up any slack or gap created if the Village Building and Plumbing Inspector could not take care of a matter and to give us their expertise if we need it.

ON MOTION by Trustee Miller, seconded by Trustee Walker, the following resolution was adopted:

Mayor Sheffer asks if this would continue the present method and Trustee Miller advised it would.

Trustee Kuzon asked if the retainer would be \$100 per month and Trustee Miller advised it was \$100 to the Engineer and that the assistant operated on a permit fee basis.

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Trustee Miller stated this resolution concerns itself with extending the on call alternate program with one member of the Department of Public Works to be on call during the absence of the general foreman if he is ill, off duty or on vacation. He would also be available as the need arises if the foreman is tied up with another matter. Three men have participated in the pilot program and one was selected to continue in the program. It is felt that only one man is needed for this.

Mayor Sheffer asked if there were any vacancies on the Beautification Committee and Trustee Sugg advised there was no fixed number of members.

Trustee Walker stated there are many areas of the Village that need to be improved, such as off street parking and sewers. He stated his first resolution would help with this.

ON MOTION by Trustee Walker, seconded by Trustee Miller, the following resolution was adopted:

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RESOLVED that the Mayor be authorized to sign a contract with the Osgood Economic and Development Group, Inc. for the purpose of seeking funding for various Village projects. In the event that Osgood is unsuccessful in obtaining any grant or assistance for the Village, the maximum cost to the Village of Williamsville will be \$1,000 for services and the maximum of \$500.00 for reimbursible expenses.

Trustee Kuzon asked if the prices of other firms doing similiar type work had been examined. Trustee Walker stated the fee is usually around \$3,500 for this service but that since Osgood has been working for us in the past they have done us the courtesy of reducing their price to the lower fee. This is in the 1977-1978 budget. Mayor Sheffer stated that with \$4 to \$5 million available in funds, this is a very worthwhile service.

Richard Hill, 18 Brookside, stated some money should be sought for updating the traffic signals and signs which are going to have to be changed. Mayor Sheffer stated funds are needed to study and remedy off street parking as well. We are interested in any public works project money that we can get. Mr. Hill advised there is county money available to do this now.

Unanimously carried.

Trustee Walker stated his next resolution was to award the bid for the 3" fire hose. Only two bids were submitted.

Trustee Walker stated there are still some vacancies on this committee and anyone interested in joining the committee should contact him.

Mr. Anstett of the Department of Public Works stated the six shade trees that were supposed to have been planted last fall are now in front of the Ski Rack.

Mr. Anstett stated that any damage done to lawns by the sidewalk plow will be taken care of by the department as soon as sufficient top soil is obtained.

ON MOTION by Trustee Kuzon, seconded by Trustee Miller, it was moved to suspend the rules for public participation.

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Mr. Richard Hill, 18 Brookside, commented on the Main Street parking. The State made a traffic study of Main Street at the time the Center was built. We have made inquiries about obtaining a copy of their report but they do not seem to want to give us it. Mayor Sheffer stated the Village office would see if they could locate it in our records. If we cannot locate it, we should be able to obtain a copy of it under the Freedom of Information Act. Trustee Kuzon stated the study was made at the request of the Village but that the Village took no action on their report. Attorney Troy stated the Village should be able to obtain a copy of this report.

Mr. Rapport of the Tennis Center asked if the proposed formula relating to sewer charges will be available at the public hearing on April 24th. Mayor Sheffer stated they would be available at that time. This would require a local law.

Mr. Rapport stated he wanted to commend the highway department for the good job they did keeping the streets clear this winter. He suggested that anyone having problems with the sidewalk plow going on their lawn should put in guide sticks so the man knows where the sidewalk is.

ON MOTION by Trustee Kuzon, seconded by Trustee Miller, it was moved to return to the regular agenda.

Mayor Sheffer called the hearing to order at 7:45 P.M.

The Clerk read the notice of public hearing regarding the 1978-79 General Fund, Water Fund and Sewer Fund Budgets for the Village.

PUBLIC
HEARING

Mayor Sheffer stated the purpose of the hearing was to hear the residents' ideas and suggestions on the budget for the coming year. The major item of interest is the proposed segregation of all sewer revenues and appropriations from the General Fund. This would be paid separately based on a formula that includes water consumption as a factor in figuring the tax. Based on segregating the sewer cost, the tax rate would go down from \$15.28 this year to \$11.71 for the coming year. Of course, this does not represent a reduction in total dollars because there would be a separate charge for the sewers. He stated that based on this public hearing and other input the Board would be meeting on this issue several times before April 24th when the budget will be voted upon. We are required by law to have the budget passed before the end of the month and that is our regular meeting. The hearing tonight is the only mandated hearing but on April 24th we could hold an informal hearing on any changes the residents would like to speak on.

James Saia, 20 Belmont, stated this would place an extra burden on our senior citizens, charitable organizations, vets, etc. He asked how the Village was going to pass this sewer rate on to the residents and asked if the Board had a formula yet for determining the cost.

General, Water, Sewer
Fund

Mayor Sheffer stated one option is to base the tax strictly on percentage of water consumption. He stated other municipalities in the area (such as Orchard Park, Akron, Gowanda, Springville, Alden, Wellsville, the Village of Kenmore and Town of Tonawanda) base their rate strictly on percentage of water consumption. The theory is that use of the sewers is not a tax but a utility and those who use it should pay for it. Other options include 40% water consumption, 40% property assessment and 20% on front footage, square footage or number of fixtures. This is done in the Town.

Budgets
1978-79

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Mr. Saia stated this would be an undue hardship on our senior citizens by increasing their taxes. It is an undue hardship on all our residents because if use a consumption basis it would take away taxation from the businesses and put it on the residents. He also stated there is some question as to whether or not the new charge could be deducted from income taxes or not. Mayor Sheffer stated these items are all being considered and will be studied carefully before the final determination is made.

Former Trustee Walter Hansen stated a study was made about three years ago on this matter and it was found that if sewer charges were based on water consumption a substantial increase in cost to homeowners would result. He stated that someday there will be a State mandate forcing us to remove sewer charges from the General Fund. Until that time we might be better off to raise the tax rate as this way the senior citizens and veterans could still make use of their exemptions. Mayor Sheffer stated this is a possibility being looked into.

Richard Hill, 18 Brookside, stated the tax man he spoke with stated the sewer charge would not be deductible if it were not part of the General Fund. Mayor Sheffer stated this is a major item being considered. He asked if it could be part of the tax rate even if you use a formula. Mayor Sheffer stated the Town does this. However, the Village cannot create a separate district for the tax. The Town can.

Mr. Hill asked why there was a reduction in salaries but an increase in benefits under the sewer portion of the budget. He was advised it was because this year there is no infiltration and inflow study and where the engineer received \$35,000 last year this year it is only \$10,000. The employee benefits come under their contract arrangement.

Mrs. Carolyn Schlifke, 192 Evans, asked if any consideration had been given to the use of water in the summer when you fill pools, wash cars and water gardens. Perhaps this is a point in favor of using a percentage of consumption as a basis.

Mr. Saia stated that while we know we will have to do this in the future we should not rush into anything and do this before we have to. Mayor Sheffer stated most municipalities are already doing this. He thinks the time to consider the matter is now. The issue has to be discussed.

Mr. Saia asked why salaries are listed under sewer expenses to be charged under the segregation proposal and Mayor Sheffer stated that under State law you have to put in everything that applies to sewers and sewage treatment.

Mr. Hill asked about sewer costs in a few years and Mayor Sheffer stated that in a decade, if we participate in the District 16 sewage

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treatment plant, the sewer cost to the Village would be higher than the General Fund within eight to ten years.

Mr. Hill asked how sewer costs are figured in relation to the wages of a man in the Department of Public Works and Mayor Sheffer stated this is based on the number of hours spent in this area.

ON MOTION by Trustee Kuzon, seconded by Trustee Walker, the hearing was closed at 8:07 P.M.

Mayor Sheffer called the hearing to order at 8:07 P.M.

The Clerk read the notice of public hearing regarding the 1978-1979 Federal Revenue Sharing Fund budget for the Village. The anticipated Federal Revenue Sharing Funds for 1978-1979 are \$40,900.00.

Mayor Sheffer stated this is the second of two federally mandated public hearings on the allocation of these funds. The first hearing was held at our last meeting. We presented requests that had been made which were higher than the funds available. At the last hearing, Mr. James Saia recommended using some of the money for studying the sewer question. He stated the final decision had not yet been made on how to spend the money.

PUBLIC HEARING

Mr. James Saia, 20 Belmont, stated \$18,900 was listed for snow removal equipment. He stated he approved of the sidewalk plow but believed that \$4,700 had been spent to repair the old one, that a new four-wheel drive vehicle had been purchased for \$9,000 or \$10,000 and supposedly had the capacity to plow and that now there was money being spent on a new plow. He stated we should look at the equipment we have on hand that perhaps we should not have spent so much fixing up the old plow.

Trustee Miller stated it only took approximately \$500 to repair the old sidewalk plow. There was no increase in the number of vehicles in the department as the old van was sold when the new truck was purchased. The four wheel vehicle was used on some sidewalks and on some narrow and dead end streets.

1978-79

A gentleman complained that the new sidewalk plow had torn up a foot or so of his grass. He thinks the money could be put to better use.

Mayor Sheffer stated that everytime this question is discussed the Village majority is in favor of having the plow. It is a big help to senior citizens and those who cannot shovel their walks themselves. It also benefits the children who walk to school so they don't have to go into the street.

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The gentleman stated the V-shaped plow blade did it. The other blade did not. Trustee Miller stated that particular plow had a larger blade on it than the one we have now. It was loaned to us by the Town until we got our new one. There are many people in the Village who want to see this service continued.

A senior citizen stated he and his wife appreciate this service very much as they have trouble walking in the snow and with the use of the plow they are able to get out and walk. The man also stated they enjoyed very much the Sunday meals at the Senior Citizens Center. They are well attended and they want to see them continue this.

Mr. Saia asked if any provisions have been made to make a study of an alternative disposal of sewage waste in the Village other than by going through the Town. Trustee Miller stated the alternative of a separate plant is being considered as are other alternatives.

Mr. Saia stated that with respect to traffic on Main Street it was recommended some years ago that the toll barrier at Williamsville be taken out and that there be an exit from the Youngmann at Sheridan Drive. He asked if the Board couldn't do something about these things as both would help to alleviate the traffic situation. Mayor Sheffer stated these things are being looked into and substantial efforts have been put forth on these matters.

Fire Chief Lavery stated the Fire Department has requested an extra \$1,500 to maintain equipment. The department is in the red now in this area. Mayor Sheffer stated \$7,000 is tentatively allocated towards truck repairs. Almost that much has been spent this year so far and we still have a few months to go.

ON MOTION by Trustee Walker, seconded by Trustee Kuzon, the hearing was closed at 8:22 P.M.
