Mayor Kuzon called the informational hearing to order at 7:32 PM. He then turned the hearing over to Trustee Sugg.

PUBLIC  
HEARING

Trustee Sugg stated that several months ago the Town and Village Boards made regulations for the use of Glen Park. These were different from the regular park regulations. We did not do the regulations for use of the Nature Building at that time. The Building Inspector has set the capacity of the building based on square footage and fire-safety requirements. Trustee Sugg then reviewed the proposed regulations.

NATURE  
BUILDING  
REGULATIONS

Section 26.150 deals with Nature Building Capacity - Occupancy by more than 50 persons shall not be permitted, in accordance with fire-safety requirements established by the building inspector.

Trustee Sugg stated she will review each section and ask for comments on each one individually. There were no comments on this section. She stated the regulations have been reviewed by Mr. Troy and the Glen Park Joint Board.

Section 26.160 deals with Permits - Groups consisting of 1-50 people may use the Nature Building only after written permission by the Glen Park Joint Board and permit issued through the Village Clerk subject to all Glen Park rules and regulations.

Mr. Leslie Simmons, 125 Monroe Drive, asked if a fee was provided for and Trustee Sugg stated that was covered in the next section.

Section 26.170 deals with Permit fee - There shall be a non-refundable \$5.00 fee charged for each permit. Supervised non-profit groups (Boy Scout, Girl Scout, school groups, etc.) shall be subject to no charge beyond the \$5.00 permit fee. Private or profit-making groups shall be assessed the following amounts: Groups of 1-25: \$25.00 non-refundable maintenance fee, \$25.00 deposit; Groups of 25-50: \$40.00 non-refundable maintenance fee, \$25.00 deposit. Deposits will be refunded if building is

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restored to condition it was in prior to the issuance of the permit. Permits will be issued to adults only if adequate supervision of all is guaranteed.

Trustee Sugg stated this section is still being worked on.

Mr. Simmons asked what the legal adult age is in the Village. Trustee Sugg and Mr. Troy advised it was 18 years old.

Section 26.180 deals with Supervision - An authorized representative of the Village or Town must be on the premises for the duration of the permit request and shall be responsible for maintaining the fire when needed and for securing the building.

REGULATIONS

There were no comments on this section. Trustee Sugg stated that when one files a request for a permit the authorized person will be appointed.

Section 26.190 deals with Time Schedule - The Nature Building will be open no earlier than 7:00 AM and no later than 9:00 PM by issuance of a permit or at other times as announced by the Glen Park Joint Board.

Trustee Sugg stated the building may be opened when there is ice skating in the pond behind the building for use as a warm-up area or at other times as may come up in the future.

Mr. Simmons asked if there will be a limit on who may apply for a permit. In our other parks you have to be a resident of the Village or Town but nothing is said in these regulations regarding this. Trustee Sugg said the regulations do not say it is closed to non-residents. We had not considered this and may want to consider doing this.

ON MOTION by Trustee Murray, seconded by Trustee Brenton, the hearing was closed at 7:40 PM.

Mayor Kuzon called the informational hearing to order at 7:40 PM. He stated no legal notice is required for an informational hearing. Basically, the hearing deals with the preservation and restoration of Main Street by the State Department of Transportation.

Mayor Kuzon stated the program of preservation and restoration will start at the exit of the I-290 and go easterly on Main Street, stopping at approximately Academy and Park Drive. They do plan some other things outside of the Village but we want to consider the work to be done in the Village.

Mayor Kuzon stated that starting at Union Road on the north side of the street they plan on widening it by two feet. They will go easterly on Main Street to approximately Grove Street. They will not widen the area from Grove and Los Robles up to approximately Mill Street. Essentially, the central business district will not experience any widening of Main Street but will have resurfacing and preservation work done. There will be work done on the curbs and sidewalks and tree planting. Beginning at approximately Mill Street and going east to the end of the contract at Park and Academy, the street will be widened by two feet on each side of the street. Work will also be done there on curbs, sidewalks and tree planting.

WIDENING OF  
MAIN STREET

Mayor Kuzon stated the reason for the widening (some by two feet and some by four feet) is to achieve a uniform width of 72 feet. The widening will allow installation of a median for left turning lanes at all signalled intersections. The 36 foot width on each side will allow for two 11 foot driving lanes and an 8 foot parking lane where we presently have parking. The next two public hearings concern prohibiting parking on a portion of Main Street. There will be some new curbing put in but in some areas will be taking out the granite type curbs and then reinstalling them when the work is done. They have a comprehensive tree planting program.

Mayor Kuzon stated this is the scope of the work to be done. The drawings are at the front of the room if anyone would like to come up and see them. They will also be available in the Village Office and you are welcome to come in and see them.

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Mr. O'Grady, a resident of the Williamsville Towers, asked what the effect would be on the Towers. Mayor Kuzon advised him the work would only be going to Park Drive and Academy. Mr. O'Grady asked if there would be widening beyond that point and Mayor Kuzon advised that there would be no further widening under this contract. The remainder of Main Street could be done next year.

Dr. Philip Vullo, 5666 Main Street, asked if it was known when the work will start and how long it will take. Mayor Kuzon stated the drawings are now in Albany for final review. They will let the contract around March 20th but do not know the schedule after that. They plan on doing it during the next construction season and finishing it before the end of the season. He asked Al Taylor of the State Department of Transportation about this. Mr. Taylor stated it will be let on March 20th and construction normally begins within 45 days (around May 1st). They expect completion sometime in December so will complete it in this one season.

Dr. Vullo asked if they will be doing one side at a time and Mr. Taylor stated traffic will be maintained at all times. It is the contractor's obligation to maintain traffic at all times. Dr. Vullo asked about the effect on the business parking and Mr. Taylor stated it will be maintained also. It will be disrupted at times in the immediate area of curb and resurfacing work.

Glenn Childs, 4932 Sheridan Drive, stated he owns property on Main Street and thought the widening should be extended beyond Park and Academy. Also questioned why parking should be prohibited in that area. Mayor Kuzon stated the prohibition of parking will be spoken to at our next hearing. The State is trying to get a uniform width. At Garrison and Evans the road begins to narrow. There will be public hearings regarding the parking in the Garrison to Park Drive and Evans to Academy Street blocks. Because of the narrowing there, the State wants to prohibit parking so traffic can blend into the existing width of the street. At present motorists park in the concrete gutters that are there. The State will be taking these out and installing curbs. With the curbs there will be no room for parking.

Mayor Kuzon asked if any Board member wanted to comment on the State work such as on the tree planting, curbing or sidewalks.

Trustee Murray stated she would report on the tree planting. The State will be removing 35 trees planted by the Village and they will immediately put in new trees when the work is done. It seems like an imposition on the Village but the State will be finishing our tree planting program for us. She stated she thinks we will come out ahead in the long run. We will be having our 10 year tree program done in five years. Since the State will be planting the additional trees to finish our program, we will have to decide where we want the remainder of the trees we have available to be planted.

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Trustee Brenton commented on the sidewalk plans. This Board has received complaints about poor sidewalks on the north side of Main Street, generally in the area to be widened and it is the intent of the State to look at the sidewalks that are there and if they are in poor shape they will replace them. These would be limited to those in the right-of-way only. In some areas there is concrete from the curb to the storefront but are only talking about what would normally be considered sidewalk.

Mayor Kuzon stated that ten to eleven years ago the State had recommended to the Village that there was congestion on Main Street and to improve the flow of traffic parking should be removed. This time they have come to us with a plan which is generally acceptable to all because it improves the flow of traffic and still retains the parking. We will have to put up with some inconvenience but we will see some results.

Mayor Kuzon advised that if anyone had any questions or problems concerning this they should not hesitate to call the Village Board members and if they wish to look at the plans they are available in the Village Office and they can come in and look them over.

Dr. Vullo asked at what intersections there would be left turn lanes and Mayor Kuzon advised they would be at all signalled intersections. Mr. Taylor stated there would be a left turn center lane the entire length of the area. It will be similiar to that west of Union Road to the Youngmann. It will be a continuous median to be used for making any left hand turns. The material being used for the median will stand out and make it easier to see that it is there for turns.

Dr. Vullo asked how they were going to get the extra width out of the areas where they were not doing any widening. Mr. Taylor stated the lanes there now are more than adequate and will be using the excess width to make the additional lane.

ON MOTION by Mayor Kuzon, seconded by Trustee Atkinson, the hearing was closed at 7:55 PM.

Mayor Kuzon called the public hearing to order at 7:55 PM.

The Clerk read the notice of public hearing regarding a Local Law which would amend Section 60.32(21) of the Traffic Code by adding thereto a new sub-section (i) which will prohibit parking on the north side of Main Street between Evans Street and Academy Street.

Mayor Kuzon stated the reason for prohibiting parking on the north side of Main Street is that when the State widens Main Street to a uniform width of 72 feet, or 36 feet per half, the street will be narrower at this point (approximately 28 feet) and will reduce the number of feet available for driving lanes. To somewhat offset this narrowing the State has requested the Board to prohibit parking on that block.

Glenn Childs, 4932 Sheridan Drive, owns property just beyond this area. He asked why the State is stopping the widening at this point and not continuing it on so that we could have parking throughout the Village.

Al Taylor of the State Department of Transportation stated this is a matter of funding. The funding available establishes the contract limit. At present motorists park in the gutter that is in this area. This is going to be removed and curbs put in. We are not narrowing the pavement, but there will be no way for cars to park in that area. You are only talking about one block. Mr. Taylor repeated that there is no funding available to go further than is presently planned.

Mr. Childs stated he feels this will affect the value of his property quite a bit.

ON MOTION by Mayor Kuzon, seconded by Trustee Sugg, the hearing was closed at 8:00 PM.

Al Taylor of the State Department of Transportation stated he did know how it would affect it. What the State is proposing is only possible if parking is eliminated in this area. He stated he did not know what the solution would be.

Mayor Kuzon asked if Mr. Taylor knew of any possible future funding that would enable the State to continue the widening throughout the entire Village. Mr. Taylor stated he did not know of any funding. He stated his own guess was that it would be a long ways down the road, and doubts it would happen within the next couple of years.

Mayor Kuzon asked whether the section between Park Drive and Transit Road would be an area of priority. Mr. Taylor stated this is not programmed now, and he can't see it happening within the next couple of years.

Mayor Kuzon asked if the State did have a program would it be to establish a uniform width in that area. Mr. Taylor stated he did not think so as the character of the area is different out there.

Trustee Brenton stated there is very little commercial property between Garrison and Park Drive and we do not envision any problems in that area. He stated Mr. Childs' situation will be as it has been. There would be no change in it do to the removal of the parking. Unfortunately, we cannot dictate to the State regarding where they should go.

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Mr. Childs asked if the curbing would be changed and Trustee Brenton advised that it would not be changed at Mr. Childs' location.

Mayor Kuzon called the meeting to order at 7:30 PM.

ON MOTION by Trustee Sugg, seconded by Trustee Brenton, the minutes of the regular meeting held December 26, 1979 were approved.

Unanimously carried.

Mayor Kuzon stated we will be holding four public hearings tonight. The first two hearings are informational hearings and do not require legal notice.

ON MOTION by Mayor Kuzon, seconded by Trustee Sugg, the rules were suspended at 7:32 PM in order to hold a public hearing regarding the regulations for the Nature Building in Glen Park. (The hearing was closed at 7:40 PM.)

Unanimously carried.

ON MOTION by Trustee Sugg, seconded by Trustee Murray, the rules were suspended at 7:40 PM in order to hold a public hearing regarding the preservation and restoration of Main Street. (The hearing was closed at 7:55 PM.)

Unanimously carried.

ON MOTION by Trustee Sugg, seconded by Trustee Murray, the rules were suspended at 7:55 PM in order to hold a public hearing regarding a local law which would amend Section 60.32(21) of the Traffic Code by adding thereto a new sub-section (i) which will prohibit parking on the north side of Main Street between Evans Street and Academy Street. (The hearing was closed at 8:00 PM.)

Unanimously carried.

ON MOTION by Trustee Brenton, seconded by Trustee Atkinson, the rules were suspended at 8:00 PM in order to hold a public hearing regarding a local law which would amend Section 60.32(21) of

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the Traffic Code by adding thereto a new sub-section (j) which will prohibit parking on the south side of Main Street between Garrison Road and Park Drive. (The hearing was closed at 8:10 PM.)

Unanimously carried.

Mayor Kuzon advised that action on the two hearings regarding prohibiting parking will take place at our next Board meeting as is our usual procedure. The informational hearings do not require any action by the Board but the State requires that the Mayor sign their drawings.

Mayor Kuzon stated our next Board meetings on January 28th and February 11th will be held on Monday night but will be in the conference room at the top of the stairs in the rear of the building. The reason for this is that the Town is administratively dealing with their zoning map and they have approximately 300 to 400 rezonings to deal with in the first quarter of this year. They usually meet on the 1st and third Mondays of the month but will be holding special meetings on January 28th and February 11th on the rezonings.

Mayor Kuzon advised that the Village and Town Boards will be reestablishing their quarterly joint meetings and will include communication, relationship and cooperation between our two Boards. Trustee Brenton, Supervisor Sharpe and the Mayor have already met on one occasion. The Town and Village Boards will be sitting down four times a year starting in January to discuss our problems and deal with them effectively.

Mayor Kuzon reported that he is sending a letter to Governor Carey regarding the reference made in his State of the State address concerning putting limits on local expenditures. He read a section of his letter stating we take strong exception to any attempt by the State to place additional financial mandates on expenditures by local governments. Local governments can function responsibly without State mandates. We feel this is another attempt by the State to control our local governments and we will not tolerate it.

Mayor Kuzon reported that a public hearing will be held regarding temporary signs. Within the time of our last two meetings temporary sign permits have been tabled until we could review our temporary sign code. The hearing will be held at our next meeting. At that time we will give you an overview of the law. A copy of the proposed law is available in the Village Clerk's Office for anyone interested in reviewing it prior to the hearing.

ON MOTION by Mayor Kuzon, seconded by Trustee Sugg, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED that the Village Clerk publish notice of public hearing to be held January 28, 1980 at 7:35 p.m. for the

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purpose of hearing all persons interested in expressing an opinion on a Local Law which would amend Section 1.18 of the Sign Code dealing with Temporary Signs.

Mayor Kuzon stated his second resolution deals with approval of sign permits for Townsend Square. Normally the Planning Board would approve all signs but since Townsend Square is an exceptional development project it is the policy of the Board that until the Certificate of Occupancy is issued by the Building Inspector the permit applications shall be approved by the Village Board with the recommendation of the Planning Board. One sign is for the Gift Rack and the other for Allstate. They have been recommended for approval by the Planning Board.

ON MOTION by Mayor Kuzon, seconded by Trustee Sugg, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED that the Gift Rack and Allstate fascia signs for Townsend Square are hereby approved.

Trustee Sugg reported that the Youth Board will hold its award dinner on Saturday, January 19th with presentations for the outstanding youth and adult volunteers. Cynthia Smith has been named Associate Director of the program at the Cayuga Road center. Efforts have been made by Trustee Sugg, the Mayor and the Director of the Youth Board to improve the relationship between the Cayuga Road residents and those using the center and things seem to be operating more smoothly.

Trustee Sugg advised that with respect to the Village Meeting House rehabilitation, we have received in the office the contract from Foit-Albert and Associates and when our attorney has reviewed them, the Mayor will sign them.

Trustee Sugg stated the park regulations discussed tonight will now be put in final form and then presented to the Village and Town Boards for their vote. They will have a conference regarding them first so that both Boards approve the same set of regulations.

Trustee Sugg reported that the Williamsville Art Society has requested and been extended approval for holding their art show in Glen Park during the second weekend in July.

Mayor Kuzon stated he had noted that some additional people had come in to the meeting and advised them that if they were here for the Main Street hearing it had been concluded but that Mr. Taylor could meet with them in the hall if they were not interested in the rest of our meeting.

The large vouchers were for Hutchinson Hose - \$8,367.51; State Social Security Agency - \$3,576.61; Niagara Mohawk - \$3,475.49; and State Social Security Agency - \$3,351.81.

Trustee Atkinson reported that back in October we started soliciting interested agencies for formation of the Insurance Advisory Committee. We want to have the committee review our entire insurance program and make recommendations. A number of agencies have expressed interest in serving on the committee. We will name three agencies to the committee tonight so they can begin functioning and hopefully in June they will be able to have their recommendations on our insurance.

ON MOTION by Trustee Atkinson, seconded by Trustee Brenton, the following resolution was adopted:

Trustee Atkinson stated that collectively these three agencies have somewhere in the neighborhood of 90 years of experience in serving on advisory committees such as for school boards. We are very pleased to have them aboard and look forward to their constructive advice.

Unanimously carried.

Trustee Brenton advised that in our pursuit of water leaks we have found two major areas of leaks, one of which has been rectified and one of which will be rectified shortly. The one still to be done is on Main Street at Cayuga. There is a large leak there and also one private surface that has a large leak. You may see men coming around checking lines to determine if you have a water leak. If you have a leak we hope you will repair it or replace it.

Trustee Brenton stated his first resolution deals with hiring of an economic consultant agency to work on increasing our target area of moderate to low income people in the Village so more people will be eligible for community development funding assistance. The additional area could be eligible for replacement of water lines that are giving us problems. We had one situation on Mill Street where an application was submitted but they were rejected because only the west side of Mill is in the target area. Since the east side is not in the area they could not use the funds.

ON MOTION by Trustee Brenton, seconded by Trustee Sugg, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED that the Mayor is authorized to sign a contract with Economic Consultants, not to exceed \$1,500.00, to be funded by Community Development funds. The purpose is to conduct a survey in a section of the Village of Williamsville in order to enlarge the target area qualifying for community development funds.

Trustee Brenton stated his next resolution deals with the often discussed Danbern Lane water line. We had advertised for bids before but did not have the specifications ready in time so we had to delay it and now we have the specifications all in and will advertisie for bids again.

ON MOTION by Trustee Brenton, seconded by Trustee Murray, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED that the Village Clerk is authorized to advertise for bids for a water line to be installed on Danbern Lane. Bids to be opened at 4:00 p.m. on January 24, 1980 in the Village Clerk's Office, 5583 Main Street, Williamsville, New York. The Clerk shall advertise for the bids in the official Village newspaper at least five days before the date on which the bids are to be opened and upon opening of the bids shall make a record by listing

the name and address of each bidder, the amount of his bid, the nature and amount of security furnished, and all alternate bids and tradein allowance, if any, and present such records to the Board of Trustees at the first regular or special meeting of the Board following the opening of the bids.

Unanimously carried.

Trustee Brenton said his third resolution deals with the possibility of the Fire Department moving across the street to the west side of the courthouse building. This Board created a Fire Department Site Selection Committee and they reported to the Board that they had determined that the best place to relocate the Hutchinson Hose Fire Station #1 on Main Street would be the west side of the courthouse building and use the basement of the present courthouse building for station purposes. In that regard we are now going to appoint a committee to develop the construction requirements necessary for the Fire Department use, the estimated cost of the building and also address the needs of the exempt firemen as they are allowed by contract with the Village to lifetime use of a room for their recreational needs.

ON MOTION by Trustee Brenton, seconded by Trustee Atkinson, the following resolution was adopted:

This committee will consist of seven members representing Hutchinson Hose Co. who will report to the Village Board by April 1, 1980 with their suggestions and recommendations determining the firematic and construction requirements of adding bays and remodeling the basement of the present Court Room Building, including the inclusion of "Exempt" firemen's recreational needs as required by lifetime contract consent on the part of the Village. Trustee Murray reported that the senior citizens recreation program is still going strong. She stated she has a copy of their schedule

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for January and if anyone is interested in the program they can obtain a copy of the schedule from her after the meeting.

Trustee Murray advised that the Environmental Council continues to work with the landscape ordinance. On January 2nd they were fortunate to have the entire Board meet with them and it was a successful evening. The ordinance will go to the Planning Board on February 4th and to the Traffic and Safety Committee on January 17th for their recommendations. We are hoping for a final draft at our February 6th Environmental Council meeting. If anyone is interested in seeing the draft of the ordinance she will be glad to supply them with one after the meeting tonight. She stated she hopes to have a public hearing and vote on the ordinance by March.

Trustee Murray reported that she has been working on the disaster preparedness plan for the Village and has studied the Town Council plans. We have received a copy of part of the Town's plan from Mr. Sharpe. We hope we can make a decision soon on the Village's disaster preparedness.

Trustee Murray stated that for the past three or four years the Old Home Day celebration has gone from a Village function to a Town and Village function and since it has been working that way we want to set up a joint Town-Village committee such as we have for Glen Park. There will be nine members from the Town and nine from the Village. She stated she will be the liason with the committee. We will not only be sharing the responsibility and members but will also share the cost.

The program will include consultants recommendations insofar as the long range development concepts of the airport and anyone interested may attend the meeting.

ON MOTION by Trustee Murray, seconded by Trustee Sugg, it was moved to suspend the rules for public participation.

Unanimously carried.

Joseph Greer, 69 S. Union, stated it has come to our attention that a resident in our area has a permit and is constructing an addition to his house to conduct a business. This is a residential area and as taxpayers of that locality and the Village we are against this. We do not want to deprive anyone of making a living. These people, through word of mouth, have been told that they could conduct this business as long as they did not put up a sign or do any advertising. We have noticed on the front door of this house that there is the name Willy's. There is a rural-type mailbox at the curb where mail is delivered door-to-door in this area and it has the name Willy's on it. Willy's was the name of the business conducted on Genesee Street in the City of Buffalo. To me this is advertising. Again, he stated they are not against anyone trying to make a living but are against a business going into a residential area. Mr. Greer stated there is a traffic problem here. This is now a four lane highway but it used to be only two lanes. It has come to pass that there are cars parked in front of this home and this cuts the four lanes down to three. If business picks up there will probably be parking on the other side also and this would cut the road down to two lanes in that area. Since Union Road was widened it has become a veritable race track. You have to struggle many times to get across that road because of the flow of the traffic and the speed of the traffic. We have nothing against anyone making money. The neighbors are wonderful people but if this business is allowed to open up at this location what is to stop somebody else from saying you gave it to them so I can have it too. If this happens we are going to wind up with businesses all around us. We bought this property with the understanding that we were buying residential property and we want to maintain it that way.

Complaints about barber shop being run on S. Union in a R-3 area

Minutes of the Regular Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Williamsville held in the Municipal Building, Williamsville, New York on Monday, January 14, 1980 at 7:30 PM

Mayor Kuzon stated that certain types of business are permitted within residential districts but a barber shop is a retail business and is not permitted in a residential district. There is action being taken on this. If he has been advised that he can use the addition for commercial purposes this is not correct. It can only be used for residential purposes. He has been advised in writing from our Building Department that the addition was approved with the understanding that it would be used for residential purposes. With respect to the question of whether he is using another part of the house to conduct this business at present, he has been informed by a second, separate letter that we have received complaints about it and that it must be stopped as that type of business is not permitted in a residential district, and that if it is not stopped legal action will be necessary. There were some other neighbors at our last meeting complaining about this. It seems apparent that they are not going to stop unless legal action is taken. Mayor Kuzon suggested that the neighbors stop in the Village Clerk's Office at the Building Department and fill out information forms about what is happening there and the activity the neighbors have witnessed. The Building Department is open from 10:00 AM tomorrow and he stated he will advise the Building Department Administrator, Mrs. Kresse, to expect them. The information forms will be turned over to our prosecutor and he will proceed to court from there. The individual will be brought to court and the ordinance clearly explained to him by the judge.

ON MOTION by Trustee Atkinson, seconded by Trustee Sugg, it was moved to return to the regular agenda.

Unanimously carried.

ON MOTION by Trustee Sugg, seconded by Trustee Murray, the meeting was adjourned at 8:40 PM.
