Mayor Kuzon: As the Clerk stated, the purpose of this hearing is to discuss the method and amounts of assessment of the sanitary sewer line extension on S. Union Road, specifically the total cost of this project. I believe it was 170 some feet - an extension of sanitary sewer line of 170 feet and the total cost of this project including construction and engineering was \$13,686.17. The purpose of this hearing is, as we stated, to discuss how this assessment, or how this amount will be assessed to the affected property owners and the Village. At this time the Village Board proposes to spread the total cost as follows: 2/3 to the affected property owners and 1/3 would be assumed by the Village as a whole. This is the same method that was used when prior sewers were constructed and will be the same method that will be used on construction of new future sewers. I would stress new sewers because under our rehabilitation program this is the rehabilitation and repair of existing sewers and another method of assessment will be used there. This is strictly for new sewers. To breakdown the cost, the Village's 1/3 of the cost would be \$4,562.06 and the property owner's 2/3 share of the cost would be \$9,124.11.

A little background on this proposal - It was in August, 1980 I believe that the four or five residents of S. Union Road petitioned the Village Board for installation of a sanitary sewer line and upon receipt of that petition the Village proceeded to install the line in the least expensive way it could and this is what we arrived at. Now taking this amount - this \$9,000 plus or minus, it is further proposed that it be spread on the

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property owners. We have, I believe there are four property owners that are benefiting from this extension of the sanitary sewer line and our proposal is that their 2/3 of the cost would be split on their property on the basis of the number of feet of lot frontage and I believe each property owner has received a letter with the exact amount that their bill would be. Now regarding the specifics, each property owner has a number of options, or actually two options. The first option would be to pay the bill in total - the total cost in one payment without interest. If the bill is then paid the person no longer is liable for this cost. However, if the person prefers, the amount that they are to pay will be spread over their property tax bill - on their property tax bill for a period of 20 years. However, interest will be included in this charge. In talking with the Clerk before the meeting, she indicated that our interest charge now is approximately 9%. But that's during the current year. As you all are aware, the cost of money is increasing and the interest rate next year could be 12% to 15% so that those costs would have to be added onto the individual property owners individual amount. As I think I stated, we are proposing to spread this over a 20 year period and that basically sums up our proposal.

Trustee Murray: Thank you. I would like to report first on the conference that the Clerk and I attended September 15th through the 18th - the 26th Annual Training School for Fiscal Officers and Municipal Clerks. On Tuesday the 15th, we arrived and attended a general session on OSHA and on Wednesday and Thursday we attended classes and I will list some of the classes for the Board's information and your information. We attended classes on real property tax exemptions; recent opinions of State agencies; public officers liability; local laws, ordinances and resolutions; village elections - and that continued into the afternoon and was very interesting; - capital programs; municipal cooperation agreements; capital project funding accounting and contracting out services; opening organizational meetings; municipal investments; and Village Clerks' seminar and Village Fiscal Officers seminar. They were going on simultaneously and the two of us attended different classes. On Friday there was a general session that dealt with previously submitted questions from the people who had been at the conference and I found the conference fascinating. I enjoyed it and learned a lot and I'm very grateful for the opportunity to have gone to it.

I regret that I received a letter of resignation from Mary Lee Rath, a resident of Reist Street, a member of the Environmental Advisory Council. Because of her age she feels that she needs to resign and I accept it with regret. We now have two openings on the Environmental Advisory Council and would ask that if you know of anyone who would be interested, you would give me their name.

My two resolutions tonight - the first one pertains to federal revenue sharing funds and it merely states that we will promise the federal government that we will comply with the required procedures for receiving federal revenue sharing funds - for instance we would publish our notice of public hearing and hold a public hearing.

Trustee Brenton: Mr. Mayor, I'd like a roll call on this please.

Trustee Brenton - no - In explanation of my no vote I would like to say that it might seem inconsequential in that it only involves 30 days, but this particular individual that it does involve has been with us for a quite considerable length of time coming from the Welfare Department a couple of years ago, and in the recent past he has been continuously appointed as a seasonal laborer or seasonal employee in one way or another and it's my feeling we're taking advantage of the individual because we're only paying him \$3.35 an hour, contrasted with approximately \$4.00 something an hour for an employee with his seniority being that he would be a new employee. I also have the feeling that it was the intention that we could do this work with our own forces, granted that then the budget of the Glen Park Joint Board would be required to pick up the cost of one of our Department of Public Works men which would be considerably higher than paying this individual and thus we would run through the remaining budget for this year that much quicker, and I understand that this would be the case. However, I do feel that our own forces could better handle this situation and I was also considering, and as I explained to the Board in our work session, that this particular individual could be utilized as a water meter reader effective October 1st, which we are in need of. By continuing him in this capacity we will have to obtain a water meter reader and thus lose this individual's services and at the end of October this individual will cease to be employed by the Village of Williamsville and for that reason I'm voting no on this resolution.

Trustee Murray - yes

Mayor Kuzon - no, and I would explain my vote that it was my understanding that we had resolved the situation at our last meeting where this individual would be hired

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for the period ending September 30th and since that time nothing has taken place that would make me change my mind - to make me extend his period of employment.

Trustee Murray: That concludes my report.

Mayor Kuzon: Thank you. Trustee Bancroft.

Trustee Bancroft: Thank you, Mr. Mayor. I have no report this evening and one resolution. Bea Slick has been our coordinator of our senior recreation program now for, I believe, 2½ years and this resolution reappoints her for another year. She has done an outstanding job and our program is very successful.

Mayor Kuzon: Thank you. Trustee Brenton.

Trustee Brenton: Thank you, Mr. Mayor. For a report I would like to report that the contractor is now finishing up on Brookside Drive. Unfortunately for those residents a shade too early. They had given me their verbal agreement to give me two days notice before they went in and did the final topsoil and seeding due to the fact that we intend to put our street lights in and they got ahead of us. So they put some seed down on a good portion of the project and I'm afraid we're going to have to go in in a couple of days and dig up there but we'll replace the seed and topsoil we dig up for the underground cable for our street lights up there.

Basically, our highway paving program is concluded for this season with the exception of Los Robles - that block from Main Street to Milton on which we're awaiting the result and acceptance of our sanitary sewer rehabilitation project which is out for bids right now. If a miracle takes place and the work which is scheduled to be - the work is scheduled to be done on Los Robles is done before the conclusion of the paving season we would pave it with an armor coat after that sewer work is done. However, I expect we will have to wait until next year for this.

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I'll move to my resolutions. We have several firemen to appoint to our fire department tonight. The reason that we have several is that we have been quite awhile in obtaining the names of the new firemen and so that we have a compilation of new firemen for about a year and a half and it is the custom - or it is the requirement of this Board to approve of these members and that is what we are doing here tonight.

Trustee Kibby: Thank you, Mr. Mayor. For my report this evening I'd just like to announce that Community Development Funds for housing rehabilitation are now available and that the Village is presently developing procedures for identifying those houses in the Village that are eligible for rehabilitation and the criteria that we will use to determine exactly which homes will be receiving community development loans for rehabilitation.

I would like to point out that we did have a public hearing on that and that major points of this law include 1) that there will be a license fee of \$100 per machine, 2) that game rooms will be any facility that has four or more games and 3) that the game rooms are restricted to C-3 or M Districts in the Village and that the license fees for a game room, or a game arcade is \$500 for the game room/arcade license and \$100 per machine. I would also add that the only aspect of this particular code that has any twinge of in loco parentis is the fact that we do require that any facility that has up to 24 machines must have one adult 21 years of age or older in supervision, and if they have more than 24 machines they must have two adults of 21 years of age or older in supervision. We have not - we did not intend to and it was by clear foresight that we did not include such aspects as the age of children who may or may not play, etc.

My second resolution reads:

COIN-OPERATED AMUSEMENT DEVICES

Sec. 3.200 COIN OPERATED AMUSEMENT DEVICES

3.200 (1) TITLE. This law shall be known as the Village of
Williamsville Coin-Operated Amusement Device Law.

3.200 (2) DEFINITIONS.

Coin-Operated Amusement Device is defined as any amusement machine or device operated by means of the insertion of a coin, token or similar object for the purpose of amusement or the testing of skill, and for the playing of which a fee is charged.

Proprietor. - is defined as any person, firm, corporation, partnership, association or club, who or which, as the owner or lessee has control of any establishment, place or premises in which one or more coin operated amusement devices is placed or kept for use or play or on exhibition for the purpose of use or play.

Amusement Center - is defined as any premises wherein are located four or more, coin operated amusement devices under the ownership, lease or control of one proprietor.

3.200 (3) LICENSE REQUIRED. No person, firm or corporation shall engage in business as a proprietor of coin operated amusement devices or as a proprietor of an amusement center, as herein defined, after January 1, 1982, without having first secured a license therefor issued

by the Village Clerk.

3.200 (4) LICENSES AND FEES. The license fee shall be \$100.00 annually, for each coin operated amusement device for which license is required.

The license fee for each amusement center shall be \$500.00 plus \$100.00 for each coin operated amusement device on premises.

License fees for each coin operated amusement device or amusement center shall be payable annually, in advance, and shall accompany the application for license. Where application is made after the expiration of any portion of any licensed year, a license may be issued for the remainder of the license year upon payment of a proportionate part of the annual fee. All licenses shall expire on the 31st day of December of each year.

3.200 (5) EXEMPT ORGANIZATIONS. A church, fraternal organization, veterans organization, or other religious, charitable, or non-profit association which maintains coin operated amusement devices on premises owned or controlled by it, for the exclusive use of members and guests, shall not be required to secure a license as otherwise hereunder required.

3.200 (6) APPLICATION FOR LICENSE by a proprietor shall be made on a form to be secured from the Village Clerk. Any application for license must include thereon the name and the address of the owner of each of the coin operated devices if not owned by the applicant. The

application shall also include thereon the name of the manufacturer, serial number, the trade name and a general description of each coin operated amusement device for which license is sought.

3.200 (7) Each license, which shall be non-assignable and non-transferrable, shall be posted in a conspicuous place on the premises of the licensee.

3.200 (8) AMUSEMENT CENTER - RESTRICTION ON LOCATION. No license for an amusement center shall be issued for any premises located in any zoning district except those classified in the Village Zoning Law as C-3 and M-1, nor for any premises located within one hundred feet of any premises of an "R" zoning classification, nor within five hundred feet of any public or private educational institution without prior approval of the Village Board of Trustees after a public hearing on the application.

3.200 (9) AMUSEMENT CENTER - ADDITIONAL RESTRICTIONS. Any amusement center licensed hereunder shall during hours of operation be at all times under the control and supervision of an adult person over the age of twenty-one years. If the number of coin operated amusement devices on premises exceeds twenty-four (24) an additional full time adult person, over the age of twenty-one years, shall be required to supervise and control premises during hours of operation.

This local law shall take effect immediately.

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Williams is not to be taken as any kind of negative reflection on Mr. Meidel's performance. When Mr. Meidel was directed last fall to begin fire inspections in addition to his building and plumbing inspections he carried these duties out professionally, competently. His onsite inspections, follow-up, reinspections and record keeping were excellently conducted and he is to be commended for his performance as fire inspector. But the simple problem is Mr. Meidel's wage as a building inspector is much, much greater than the wage of a fire inspector and so this then was purely for financial reasons.

Unanimously carried.

Thank you, Mr. Mayor.

Mayor Kuzon: Thank you. Mr. Way from the Department of Public Works.

Mr. Way: I have no report tonight, Mr. Mayor. I would just like to add we know that the leaves are going to be coming down and I would like to go on record asking the people that when they rake them not to put them in the street. When we get heavy rains they flood the DI's and we have to clean them out. They should put them between the sidewalk and the street. Thank you, Mr. Mayor.

Mayor Kuzon: Thank you.

ON MOTION by Trustee Kibby, seconded by Trustee Bancroft, it was moved to suspend the rules for public participation.

Unanimously carried.

Mayor Kuzon: At this point anyone in the audience may address the Board. We ask that you state your name and address for purposes of the record.

Donald Weimer, 65 Mill Street: I believe you gentlemen know of what the problem was and I was wondering what your decision was.

Mayor Kuzon: I received your letter to the Board and that is on our agenda for our after session tonight and it was my intention to talk to the full Board. This is actually the first time the full Board has been together since our last meeting. So my intention was to discuss your letter and also the results of the meeting Trustee Brenton had with you since our last meeting so no decision has been reached but it is on the working agenda for further discussion.

Mr. Weimer: May I be a participant?

Mayor Kuzon: All our meetings are open and public.

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Trustee Kibby: You can be an observer. Anyone is allowed to attend.

Mr. Weimer: Thank you.

Mayor Kuzon: Anyone else? Any Board member? Seeing none. . .

ON MOTION by Trustee Kibby, seconded by Trustee Bancroft, it was moved to return to the regular agenda.

Unanimously carried.

Mayor Kuzon: If no one has anything else. . .

ON MOTION by Trustee Murray, seconded by Trustee Brenton, the meeting was adjourned at 8:08 PM.

Unanimously carried.
