Clerk: PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that the Board of Trustees of the Village of Williamsville will hold a public hearing in the Municipal Building, 5583 Main Street, Williamsville, New York on June 28, 1982 at 7:35 PM for the purpose of hearing all persons interested in discussing a proposed local law which would amend Section 1.17 of the Sign Code of the Village of Williamsville regarding Window Signs.

ON MOTION by Trustee Murray, seconded by Trustee Brenton, the hearing was opened at 7:35 PM.

Mayor Kuzon: At this time I will turn the public hearing over to our attorney, Tom Troy.

Mr. Troy: Trustee Kibby has asked me to cover this matter for him this evening. He has graduation and as a member of the Board of Education he is expected to be present.

The existing 1.17 of the code, sign code, relating to window signs in the Village of Williamsville states as follows:

"Signs shall be permitted in a window or incorporated in a window display of merchandise. There shall be no limit to the number of such signs, provided, however, that the total area of all window signs shall not exceed twenty (20) percent of the window glass area on the side of the building where signs are located. An additional ten (10) percent of window area may be used to advertise non-profit activities for a period of not more than 21 days prior and 7 days after the advertised event."

That has been the extent of the existing section. We've encountered a problem with certain merchants in the Village who feel that in calculating the total amount of window space they have a right to calculate and include therein in figuring their 20% not only the windows on the first floor of the building in which they're doing

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their business activity, but if they happen to have space on the second floor they want to include that too in calculating the total percentage of window space. After considerable discussion by the Village Enforcement Committee and the other appropriate committees, it was decided that this was not the intent or purpose of the law and that there should be a restriction, and to that extent, or for that purpose, Section 1.17 will have an added qualifier which states as follows:

"For purposes of this Section, calculation of window glass area shall be limited to windows located on the same floor as the window signs and shall exclude any windows within a door frame."

We've also had problems with reference to including the glass in a door in calculating the percentage. This law, of course, would take effect immediately. That's the extent of the modification, or amendment of the law. It will exclude in calculations window glass on a floor other than that on which the sign is located and it will also exclude window glass in any doorway even though it is on the same floor as the particular sign. Any questions? Yes, Dick.

Richard Hill, 18 Brookside Drive: If there's a two story building - I think I know the building you're talking about - if there's companies upstairs they can advertise on their floor.

Mr. Troy: That's right.

Mr. Hill: Okay.

Mr. Troy: Anything else? Anybody else?

Mayor Kuzon: If there's no further discussion....

Mayor Kuzon: At this time a motion would be in order for approval of the minutes.

ON MOTION by Trustee Brenton, seconded by Trustee Murray, the minutes of the regular meeting held June 14, 1982 were approved.

Mayor Kuzon: Next on the agenda is a public hearing regarding a proposed local law which would amend Section 1.17 of the Sign Code concerning window signs.

ON MOTION by Trustee Murray, seconded by Trustee Brenton, the hearing was opened at 7:35 PM. (The hearing was closed at 7:39 PM.)

Unanimously carried.

Mayor Kuzon: For my report this evening I have one item. That is that the Village Board has received information that Mr. Way is resigning his position as General Foreman in the Department of Public Works. Following that resignation, Trustee Brenton as D.P.W. liaison will assume temporary administrative responsibilities in that department and serve in that function until a suitable replacement is found.

I have one resolution this evening. That's for vouchers.

That's all I have. Trustee Kibby is not here. As Tom has stated, he is attending the South High School graduation. Next will be Trustee Murray.

Trustee Murray: Thank you. At our last meeting I announced that the Parks and Recreation Committee met jointly with the Traffic and Safety Committee and that the Board would be discussing that meeting and making a decision after our last Board meeting. At that time we discussed the recommendation that came out of that meeting and decided to approve that recommendation and since then have had a meeting with the police and the fire department to determine what should be done. The result is that during Old Home Days the streets that are posted on one side no parking will be enforced and those that are not posted on either side no parking one side will be temporarily posted with no parking or standing signs. The police department, during Old Home Days, will keep one side of the road open at all times and the ordinances will be strictly enforced and cars will be ticketed if they are parked in a no parking zone. I'd appreciate it very much if the Amherst Bee and the Courier Express would help us with this by announcing to the public that their cars will be ticketed during Old Home Days. We feel it's important that the public know in advance that the ordinances will be enforced during the so-called festival.

I have one resolution tonight calling for a public hearing at a request of a resident of Columbia Drive. The gentleman tells me there used to be a stop sign on Columbia at Scott and upon investigation we found that there had been one there but it was not legal and it was not in the ordinance. So I asked the Traffic and Safety Committee to look into putting a stop sign there and

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their recommendation is that we do so. So, therefore, I have to change or add to the Village Code and my resolution calls for a public hearing on that subject.

Mayor Kuzon: Thank you. I'm just going to add one thing before we go to Trustee Saia, and that is by looking at the calendar I notice there is the Glen Park Art Show held in July, and I would also add that it is our intent that parking regulations be enforced consistently for any event in the Village that would draw additional traffic. As Connie said, our main reason for doing this is to insure proper access for fire and rescue vehicles. And as I said, it is the consistent intention by the Village Board that this not only be for Old Home Days but for the Art Show, which draws a considerable crowd, and for any other event in the Village where the possibility of traffic congestion exists. Trustee Saia: Thank you. I've got a resolution and I've also got some comments. My resolution for this evening is:

ON MOTION by Trustee Saia, seconded by Trustee Murray, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED that William N. Ellsworth be hired as a Seasonal Laborer in the Glen Park from June 23, 1982 until October 1, 1982 at the rate of \$3.45 per hour and his salary be paid from the Town of Amherst/Village of Williamsville Glen Park Joint Activities Fund.

This person was hired by Councilman Moses and the reason being is our Glen Park Committee is a dual committee of the Town and Village and I hired one from the Village and Mr. Moses hired one of the youths from the Town to work at Glen Park during the summer.

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I also have an Andrew Jenis, he's a young man, he's a Boy Scout trying to get one of the medals. He came up with a brilliant idea he proposed to the Glen Park Board and we sanctioned it and that is that all the trees in Glen Park will be - so - he will tag every tree down in Glen Park with its proper and its Latin names and he's got some plaques that will be affixed to the trees. I hope people will leave them alone and don't destroy them because we think it's a wonderful idea and we've got to thank Mr. Andrew Jenis for doing this for Glen Park.

Also, our pools are now open but we've been having some problems with the Garrison Park pool and I hope it will be resolved either tomorrow or the next day, but if you find the water a little cold in there we're having some problems. We will correct it.

Another thing is, Gordon mentioned this Art Show, it slipped my mind, but I'm glad he mentioned it and I've got an offer to the Fire Chief that if he wants some signs to post down there, if he's having any problems, let us know and we'll get him some help and take care of any traffic problems he's going to have in and around the Art Show. Thank you.

Mayor Kuzon: Thank you. Trustee Brenton.

Trustee Brenton: Thank you. For my report tonight I would report that the Village Board will be considering a proposal from URS Corp. in our work session later on this evening whereby we will have to file a grant amendment for our Sanitary Sewer Program. This is made necessary by a revision in Phase 2 and Phase 3 of our Sanitary Sewer Program, a consolidation, if you will, which I recommended to the engineering firm of URS in that I felt that many of the original items that were called for in the original sanitary sewer evaluation survey, some of those items at any rate could be done by our own Department of Public Works forces rather than incur engineering and inspection services which were billed into the original grant so, therefore, it will be necessary for us to seek a grant amendment from the Department of Environmental Conservation to facilitate this and I don't view that as being any obstacle to our continuing sanitary sewer program.

I'll move to my resolutions. The first involves the hiring of our other Department of Public Works seasonal laborer. We already have hired one for the summer. This is the other one to be utilized in the Department of Public Works. It reads as follows:

Resolution No. 2 deals with a problem that we have incurred with remote meters, water meters. For those of you that probably don't have these devices, several years ago the Village installed a remote meter on the outside of an individual's, a customer's location so that it wasn't necessary for the meter reader to enter the dwelling in order to read the meter on a quarterly basis. It is a convenience item and we have incurred a problem whereby the remote does not in some instances reflect the actual consumption and unfortunately we have determined that we cannot rely on these remote devices for their accuracy so that we are creating a resolution here to allow for a reading either on the part of the customer or our own water personnel in order to alleviate this problem.

ON MOTION by Trustee Brenton, seconded by Trustee Murray, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED that hereafter, all charges for water consumed in any premises served by the Village water system shall be based exclusively on readings taken from a meter located in the interior of the premises. So called "remote water meters" will no longer be used to measure water consumption on any premises effective as of the date of this resolution.

I suppose I could elaborate on that a little more, by the interior of premises - the people that have remotes have an accurate water meter on the inside naturally, and that is the meter that we will hereinafter recognize.

ON MOTION by Trustee Brenton, seconded by Trustee Murray, it was moved to suspend the rules to consider a resolution not on the agenda.

Unanimously carried.

Trustee Brenton: The purpose for the suspension of rules is an additional resolution from the fire department to send two of the department members to the Niagara Mohawk Training School in Oswego, New York. The resolution reads as follows:

ON MOTION by Trustee Brenton, seconded by Trustee Saia, the following resolution was adopted:

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RESOLVED that Brad Archdeacon and Michael Schrembs be authorized to attend the Niagara Mohawk School in Oswego, New York on July 10 and 11, 1982 and the expenses not to exceed \$200 to be paid by the Village.

Mayor Kuzon: Next on the agenda is suspension of rules for public participation.

ON MOTION by Mayor Kuzon, seconded by Trustee Murray, it was moved to suspend the rules for public participation.

Unanimously carried.

Mayor Kuzon: At this time anyone in the audience may address the Board. Chief Andrews.

Rick Andrews, Fire Chief in the Village: I'd like to introduce to the Board - as you know we were here a little over a month ago in regards to our building dilemma and I'd like to introduce to you a Co-Chairman that's worked along with Joe Burden - he couldn't be here for the same reason Mike couldn't be, he's at a graduation. He'd like to read off a letter that we propose to the Village and yourself, Mayor, and the rest of the Board and Bill Pidgeon is the Co-Chairman.

Bill Pidgeon of the Fire Department: Thank you, Chief. As the Chief said my name is Bill Pidgeon and I've worked with the Building Committee for about six or seven months now. As stated, Joe Burden couldn't be here tonight because of graduation. We worked on some basic differences, or different relocations for our fire company. First of all I have a question for the Mayor. Did you receive any written correspondence from the Town Board.

Mayor Kuzon: No. I think the last time you gentlemen were here we decided to send a letter to the Supervisor with 30 days to respond. We haven't received anything in writing from the Town.

Mr. Pidgeon: I have a copy of our letter for each of you. (He passed our copies and read the letter excluding the locations and estimate of sale price for the present building. The letter related to the possibility of a new two story building for the fire company and possible space for Village offices in such building.)

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Mr. Pidgeon: Now the reason we brought it up tonight without Joe being here is we felt it was very important we start making a move in some direction. We've been working on this for a long time. It was brought up last month. It's been worked on since 1959 and different proposals have been brought about. It just seems like we're going right in a circle right now and just to take one instance, a couple of weeks ago we ran two drills. We had one for the younger men which is a state mandated EM course over at our fire hall in which other companies participate. They bring their members over there and share the same instructor. Also, we ran a smokehouse drill at the Cheektowaga drill tower and at the time we expended about 3½ hours of our time and used most of our air pack bottles up. When we got back we were there for over 3½ hours and it was nearly 10:30 at night and the way our fire hall is set up to bring the trucks back into service we don't have the room to work on them properly so we have to bring rigs over here, put rigs next to the fire hall and whatever. At the same time when we got back we had a first aid call where a person had a cardiac arrest and that took some of our men from the duties of getting our equipment back into service. It would have been a lot easier if we would have had a fire hall where we would have had the room to work on the vehicles all at once, where everything is spaced apart enough to work on one and then another or have people working on each vehicle. As it was, we had to jockey trucks around and whatever. We feel that we should try to meet with you within the next month and try to resolve which way to progress in our endeavors, whether we're going to remodel the present fire hall or as stated in here, we're going to move elsewhere. And when we talk about the appraisal in here there's three pages on the appraisal. It was a cost of about \$350 to the fire company to get the appraisal done and we got it at a cheaper rate, a discounted price. We have a 20 page report at the fire hall in case you would like to look at it some time. Joe told me to tell you that this is no fly-by-night outfit. I guess they do a lot of major commercial appraisals and it's quite a detailed report. I was looking at it the other day and they also set that up. The cost of a new fire hall, it was agreed on like a 47-53 split, and it was felt that the possibility of going to maybe a newer facility might be in the better interest of all of us. So, if there are any questions...

Mayor Kuzon: Does anyone have any questions for Bill. If not then what we need to do as a Board is decide when's a good time to sit down and meet with yourself and Joe and the other members of the Building Committee. Why don't you talk to us after the meeting and we can poll the Board and yourself and see what's a good time - get a mutual convenient date and go from there. Just to add further information as I said, I haven't received anything in writing from the Town but you know little bits and pieces that I've picked up along the way one is that their Government Study Committee I guess has studied the question of what to do with Amherst Town Court, and our Clerk has informed me that they're meeting tonight and supposedly they're supposed to make a recommendation to the Supervisor as a result of their meeting, as to whether the Court should move or renovate the

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existing structure and that's nothing that's been formally communicated to me. You know, just bits and pieces heard around the Town Hall. Another thing was that somebody from the Committee informed me that they were going to write a letter to the Village and ask what our intentions were, whether we were still serious.

Mr. Pidgeon: It's all hearsay. And it seems like it just drags on. We met last year on the same proposal and here it is a year hence. It gets to the point where it seems like nothings going to happen and we really should do something soon. Very soon.

Mayor Kuzon: At the end of the meeting why don't we get together and set a date when we can meet. Chief?

Chief Andrews: I'd like to ask Larry, or yourself, if anything has ever been done on the meeting we had back in November with the Joint Board where we talked at Station 2. They said that by January they would have the figures put together and that's the thing right there. That's the key to that building. You know it as well as I do. Figures, the agreements, the contracts, all those things have to be put together before we're going to get anywhere with this thing. I just wondered if you'd heard anything further on it.

Trustee Brenton: I have had meetings myself with various representatives of the Town government including the two newly elected councilmen and the Town Attorney at that particular meeting. To be very, very honest with you I find that as you know the Village has done everything possible for this situation to occur and probably a little more than we really should have. However, we cannot force the Town to vacate the building, or in a larger sense into making a decision and quite frankly, I have to sit here in a critical way and say that the people elected by the Town apparently have difficulty in making a decision. Now after tonight when they have a committee report perhaps that will galvanize their thoughts and maybe they'll be able to make a decision upon whether or not they should recommend the committee report. However, that is my personal feeling on that and I'm not being facetious when I say that. I just feel they have procrastinated here and they have not been able to get things together. And you referred to a meeting that we had last year where it was determined that in January we would know something, that is the Town would be able to tell us something. This was just a question of putting it off a little while longer and I frankly really lost my enthusiasm for that building over there and I've talked to Joe Burden at great length about other alternatives, two of which are here. I'm not sure I'm satisfied with the bank proposal because of the cost there but I've also discussed the possibility of fire department fiscal participation in perhaps building a new building and I really think maybe we're

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going to get more done by doing it ourselves and letting the Town go do what it wants with that building bearing in mind the contractual obligation that the Town has to the Village to provide us with a court building and that I will always bear it in mind and I hope this Board will continue to bear in mind so that perhaps the Town won't be allowed to move the courthouse once they finally decide whether to do it or not because we have a bona fide contract with the Town for that courthouse here. So I don't want to bore you but to me that's how I feel about it and I think that maybe the fire department and the Village should just say, hey, we're going to do it, let's do it ourselves and let the Town go.

Trustee Saia: I have to say, Mayor, that I'm impressed that they included the Village for offices in their new plans for a fire hall and that kind of impresses me, and I also - I must say I can't see remodeling the present location. I almost kind of think the fire company thinks the same way. The whole idea is to have a way to get into the fire hall from the rear and have some room up in front if you do pull a piece of apparatus out and just to remodel that back is just prolonging the time when you're going to have to do something. So maybe now is the time to do it.

Mayor Kuzon: Thank you. Anyone else?

Richard Hill, 18 Brookside Drive: I'd like to talk to Larry a little bit. Have you got many of these outside meters?

Trustee Brenton: About 100.

Mr. Hill: How many are you having trouble with?

Trustee Brenton: Well actually we had one primary source of trouble with one individual and basically I think our experience with about three-quarters of them is that there is not that much inaccuracy but there is some.

Mr. Hill: Every year you read them and check that differential and it is a great convenience to people like myself that put their money in that it prevents people from coming in the house every month and when you're not there you get your meter read or you get it estimated and as politicians I suppose you guesstimate it high. If it's a big problem, yes I can see it, but if there's only one person who's had a lot of problems and the rest are just a little bit off why eliminate the whole convenience for the people that want it.

Trustee Brenton: To answer your question, we're not eliminating them. We're only going on record as telling you that if in fact your remote doesn't read enough consumption and when we finally do get in there and read your inside meter you are going to pay for what that accurate inside meter says.

Mr. Hill: I know that.

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Trustee Brenton: Actually, that's not the way it works, we found out via the legal route. Prior to this resolution it was determined that the remote should be the accurate meter and that if we don't maintain them, etc., etc. then that's our fault and we just quite frankly, with a one man water department, don't have the personnel to be going out and looking at remote meters and everything else. So all we're doing here is telling the customer that we'll continue to read their remote meter but when we come in and want an interior check that if that check reveals that indeed you have consumed more water than your remote meter indicated then you will have to pay for that additional consumption.

Mr. Hill: Larry, when I had this remote put in I was told at that time that at least once a year they had a right to check my meter and if there was a discrepancy the meter downstairs was the one that counted. So I knew that right in the beginning. When my meter was not working when I had siding put on my house they went downstairs and read the meter and came upstairs and got it started working again. So as long as we can have an outside meter, okay.

Trustee Brenton: We don't even want to be bothered taking them out.

Mr. Hill: Good. Read it outside.

Mayor Kuzon: Mrs. Schlifke.

Mrs. Carolyn Schlifke, 192 Evans Street: I'm the owner of a house that has a remote meter and I want you to come and take it off because I don't want it anymore. When we bought the house it was there probably due to the fact that the tenants were always changing in the house and probably for the homeowner it was more convenient because he paid the water bill. My son lives in the house now. The meter is right under the kitchen sink so there's no problem for us to read it so I don't want it on the house and you can come and take it off.

Trustee Brenton: Okay, Carolyn. Our anticipation is that there won't be any major construction, or destruction in taking these remotes out. I'm sure there shouldn't be however, if that would be done. My first request to remove a remote meter is lying on the conference table right now with a memo to the Department of Public Works and I indicated in that memo that should there be any unforeseen problem in accomplishing this to then advise me so that I don't anticipate that there should be.

Mrs. Schlifke: I don't think there would be any problem. It's just screwed into the rear of the house and a small wire runs down into the crawl space.

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Trustee Brenton: I'm going to add your name to the memo. What's the address?

Mrs. Schlifke: 16 Franklin is where it is. I have a few remarks about the Art Show. At least three of the Board members probably recall last year after it was over I did get up and speak at the Village Board meeting of a lot of concerns about the traffic situation on that section of Glen Avenue while the show was going on. There were cars parking on the street.

Mayor Kuzon: Excuse me, Connie has...

Trustee Murray: I received a call from - I don't know if Trustee Saia has or not - from the Williamsville Art Society requesting the name of our security agency for the parks because they're hiring a security agency to be there in the morning to make sure no one parks on Glen Avenue. They have allocated a certain amount of money and they will hire someone for as many hours as that money - until that money is gone.

Mrs. Schlifke: Well that answers one of my questions. I was going to ask whether or not the Board had contacted the Art Society to tell them what the Village requires. Now, we have not had a Traffic and Safety meeting since I was aware of these dates for the Art Society Show. I did speak to two of our members this evening. What I would like to know is would the Village Board like us as a committee - we can survey our members by phone as to some recommendations or things that we feel perhaps would be helpful to the Art Society. One suggestion that I would like to make is that Glen Avenue be temporarily barricaded from Cayuga to Mill Street. There would be no residences involved in that area, strictly park. The barricades could be removed in case of an emergency. For cars to travel on that section while the show is in progress is almost an impossibility. People are crossing in all areas going from one side to another. What I would like to see is allow the exhibitors to use that area to come down early, unload whatever they're showing, and when they are unloaded and set up, use the parking lots in the park for their vehicles so that they will have them available for loading up again when the show is over. Close the area to through traffic and in case of an emergency situation then you can let emergency vehicles through.

Mayor Kuzon: The question of barricading the street I guess could be not only suggested by your committee but probably refer it to the police department and the fire department.

Mrs. Schlifke: I understand that but streets are barricaded in the Village from time to time for various reasons - for street construction, paving, for block parties, things like that. It would only be a two-day situation and I really think in the long run that the safety aspect would be more - would more than warrant it because for a car to try to travel through that area with

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people crossing that street in all areas - you're not going to be able to keep people to the cross areas - I don't think there would be an inconvenience to anyone and I think it would solve a lot of the problems.

Mayor Kuzon: I don't think the Board would have any problem with making a recommendation along those lines.

Mrs. Schlifke: I can contact the other members of our committee for their recommendations. This is something that I am bringing up at this particular time because I feel the Art Society must be given guidelines that they must conform to.

Mayor Kuzon: I would add that Connie, as a former responsibility as liaison to the Glen Park Committee, when the request came in for the Third Annual Art Show wrote back in response rather comprehensively to the Art Society regarding concerns that you expressed last year, concerns that the committee had had, concerns that the Board had, so I think she's addressed a lot of the problems that were present last year in an attempt to alleviate them for this year's show.

Trustee Murray: I must say they've been very cooperative in trying to conform to the things that we have requested.

Mayor Kuzon: Mr. Hill.

Mr. Hill: I'm just wondering if it would be necessary - I will contact all the members but I think you should think seriously of doing it no matter what the committee comes up with just - I was down there last year. It's dangerous having that road open during show time.

Trustee Murray: Could we ask the Fire Chief his opinion now?

Mayor Kuzon: We can ask for it but maybe could ask after the meeting.

Chief Andrews: I'd rather discuss it after the meeting. I'm sure we can work out any problems.

Mr. Hill: The barricade could be easily moved.

Mayor Kuzon: If there's no one else in the audience, or on the Board...

ON MOTION by Trustee Murray, seconded by Trustee Saia, it was moved to return to the regular agenda.

Unanimously carried.

Mayor Kuzon: Before adjourning I would call attention to the
