

Minutes of the Regular Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Williamsville held in the Municipal Building, Williamsville, New York on Monday, May 23, 1983 at 7:39 PM

Mayor Kuzon called the meeting to order at 7:39 PM.

Mayor Kuzon: Next on our agenda is approval of minutes.

ON MOTION by Trustee Kibby, seconded by Trustee Murray, the minutes of the regular meeting held May 9, 1983 were approved.

Unanimously carried.

ON MOTION by Mayor Kuzon, seconded by Trustee Murray, the minutes of the public hearing held May 9, 1983 regarding amending Section 60.40(16) of the Traffic Code regarding a stop sign at Howard and Glen were approved.

Unanimously carried.

ON MOTION by Trustee Kibby, seconded by Trustee Murray, the minutes of the public hearing held May 9, 1983 regarding amending Section 50.00 of the Sidewalk and Street Code were approved.

Unanimously carried.

Mayor Kuzon: For my section of the agenda this evening I have just two brief things to report. The first is that our Memorial Day Parade will be held a week from today, next Monday the 30th at 2:00 PM on Main Street.

The second thing that I would report is that the School Board Annual Meeting is this Wednesday and for those of us in the Village we have three Village residents seeking election to the School Board and I would like to bring that to your attention.

For resolutions this evening I have four. The first is for vouchers.

ON MOTION by Mayor Kuzon, seconded by Trustee Murray, vouchers in the sum of \$105,336.84 were approved as follows:

The larger of these vouchers are our annual payment to New York State Retirement of \$40,000, our bill to Erie County Water Authority for \$21,000 and payment to URS, which is our sewer consultant, \$17,000.

Unanimously carried.

My second resolution authorizes the Clerk to make all budget transfers necessary at the end of the year. This is after all accounts that are payable have been paid and all encumbrances and appropriate adjustments have been made.

ON MOTION by Mayor Kuzon, seconded by Trustee Brenton, the following resolution was adopted:

My third resolution amends the General Fund Budget total amounts and in particular, in relation to the assessed value. Since the time we prepared our budget we've had an increase of some \$40,000 in assessed value and this is due to the fact that the County has prepared the Village tax roll and forwarded it, has sent it to us, they sent us our tax roll and after receiving it we have a \$40,000 increase in our assessed value and the resolution reads:

My fourth resolution is calling for a notice of public hearing to assess the Mill Street sanitary sewer which was constructed and finished some three years ago and due to various problems has not been assessed by the Village until this year and it reads:

Trustee Brenton: On the question, Mr. Mayor, I would just like to emphasize the importance of this to the residents on the west side of the street in that they will be no doubt receiving a bill for sewers. That sewer has been in place for three years, or perhaps a little more than that so they may be unaware of it so that maybe this situation may have some significance to them because they will be paying for that sewer now as a result of our apportionment as to the Village contribution and the property owner's contribution toward the sewer.

Mrs. Carolyn Schlifke, 192 Evans Street: Is this the whole west side of the street from Main Street all the way down?

Trustee Brenton: Well not quite from Main Street, as I understand it. It's at approximately Swan Alley down to the Village Line.

Unanimously carried.

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Mayor Kuzon: That's all I have. Next is Trustee Brenton.

Trustee Brenton: Thank you. For my report tonight I would state that I've been in contact with our engineering project manager from URS Corporation regarding our Phase II and Phase III approval from the New York State DEC and also the significance of that Phase II approval would be that we are now in the final stages of sewer rehab program which contradicts what some people might have read in the paper regarding this and the fact that we have not yet done anything to address the sanitary sewer situation. So at any rate, we should know within two weeks about approval of Phase II and Phase III and hopefully if it's approved we'll have Phases II and III done this construction season and that should complete our sanitary sewer rehabilitation program. As I said I think that we should know in two weeks.

I'll move directly to my resolutions. The first resolution deals with the pavement recycler which we called for under the competitive bid process. We are going to award this particular piece of equipment to the firm that is not the low bidder. They are \$200 higher...

Trustee Saia: This is Resolution No. 2.

Trustee Brenton: I missed No. 1 and I'll go back to No. 1 and stay with No. 2 - so that the low bidder actually is not the firm that submitted the bid in compliance with our specifications so we're going to take the firm that has a \$200 higher price tag. The resolution reads as follows:

ON MOTION by Trustee Brenton, seconded by Trustee Kibby, the following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS Master Equipment Center submitted their low bid meeting specifications,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the contract for the Mobile Asphalt Recycler be awarded to Master Equipment Center for their low bid of \$8,600.00.

Trustee Kibby: I have a question. The bid, that was \$200 lower, is it true that that bid not meet the specifications totally?

Trustee Brenton: Yes. I pointed that out, I think, that that firm did not meet our specifications and primarily of concern to the Superintendent of Public Works and myself is the thermal capabilities, the heat capabilities of that particular piece of equipment. Due

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to the fact we'll be using that in the wintertime and the material has to come out hot and it's not capable of keeping the material hot and consumes more propane as a result and also we didn't think this would do as good a job.

Trustee Kibby: And this mobile asphalt recycler that we are purchasing did meet the specifications in total?

Trustee Brenton: Yes.

Trustee Kibby: Thank you.

Unanimously carried.

Trustee Brenton: That being resolution No. 2 I'll move back to resolution No. 1 which I missed and that deals with the public hearing that we held regarding the renaming of a street, it's not officially called Lehn Lane, which conflicted with the street named Lehn Springs as far as the Amherst Fire Control's opinion was. I have requested the input of the people in the senior citizens building at that location and they tell me that they would be very happy with the name Village Square Lane and this name has been submitted to the Amherst Police department and to the Amherst Fire Control. They find no conflict with that name and that of similarly named streets within their jurisdiction. Therefore, I'm going to move the name of this street as Village Square Lane and I believe we'll have a roll call vote on that. The resolution reads as follows:

ON MOTION by Trustee Brenton, seconded by Trustee Murray, the following resolution was adopted:

Square Lane is No. 1, reason No. 1, Village Square Lane is too closely similar to Village Square Apartments. Now that lane runs at a 90° angle. It runs over to S. Long and it's quite a distance to make a mistake of Village Square Lane and Village Square Apartments. Remember that the name has been changed because Lehn Lane and Lehn Springs had similarity. Now my big reason, and I asked for this vote because I as a Village, old-time Village resident, I've been here since '54, but as a Village resident I'm proud of the Village. There is a street that really is an alley. It's one-way. It shouldn't even be a street. It should be only a driveway. It should dead end at the ball diamond. One side you have a ball diamond that on ball nights like right now they're all parking on the grass helter skelter back there. The other reason is that, and it's no reflection to Phil Boureau because he's cleaned up the act down at the Village highway,

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but we've got a big pile of junk there. You know we've got tables, we've got old trucks, we've got plows sitting there on that lane and I feel kind of bad with a beautiful name of Village Square Lane being a tag to a street like that and to be honest with you if it was called by any other one name street I really probably wouldn't care too much, but I think that name kind of reflects bad taste and I know the senior citizens approved it, or at least Ed Fisher approved it, but it's a name, sort of a name that just, bad taste and I just want to go on record that I'm opposed to that name. Thank you.

Mayor Kuzon - aye

Ayes - 4; Noes - 1.

Carried.

Trustee Brenton: I would just like to answer that the name of the street I don't think has anything to do with the department of Public Works and as I pointed out in our work session I do have thoughts of perhaps dead ending that street depending on the actual right-of-way that it has so that we could in effect accomplish a more safe operation there because in spite of all our efforts we still don't have a safe operation as far as vehicles going the wrong way and turning around at the Village Square Apartments and going against traffic to exit on Main Street, etc. So that is in my long range planning and I have thought about that. That's why I feel so strongly and in particular, I think the people that do reside in a given area should be given their opportunity to express itself as they have and they have indicated to me through their representative that they would like this street to be named after their particular complex so that I'm very happy and I'm very pleased that the name of this street is that which they desired.

Resolution No. 3 deals with the question of our sidewalk, revision of our sidewalk code and as I mentioned at our last public hearing there would be a possibility that we would call for a second public hearing. Through resolution No. 3 we are calling for a second public hearing and hopefully adoption of that particular situation after that second public hearing, which we do not feel, or at least I do not feel would be unusual to adopt legislation after that public hearing, the second public hearing. Normally it would be somewhat questionable to adopt legislation after a first public hearing. It hasn't been done before but this will be our second. So the resolution reads as follows:

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Resolution No. 4 deals with the pavement marking program which I initiated. It was a federally funded program and the federal government determined through the State of New York to pay us on a lineal foot basis irregardless of how we went about it. I drew specs for the particular project and it came in at \$1,500 lower than the amount that the federal government is going to pay us. They have no reservations about paying us the full amount of money. We just never budgeted this money. In fact this money is being totally placed into that particular line item. There will be a surplus. The surplus will be encumbered for safety type changes within the Village and I'm designating this for that particular purpose, that essentially I suppose I would have the final responsibility of determining so that that is the purpose of resolution No. 4. It reads as follows:

Trustee Brenton: That's all I have, Mr. Mayor. Thank you. Oh, I'm sorry. I have to call for suspension of rules. I have a late resolution that I'd like to present here.

ON MOTION by Trustee Brenton, seconded by Trustee Kibby, it was moved to suspend the rules to consider a resolution not on the agenda.

Trustee Brenton: This resolution numbers 5, therefore, and it deals with sending our public fire prevention committee as such, our fire prevention committee actually, to a school at Montour Falls, New York and it allows that these three people should go to this school and it was submitted by Rick Andrews and they will be going, therefore, and it reads as follows:

ON MOTION by Trustee Kibby, seconded by Trustee Brenton, it was moved to return to the regular agenda.

Unanimously carried.

Mayor Kuzon: Now is Trustee Kibby.

Trustee Kibby: I have a few things to report this evening and one is that I have received a letter from Dr. Shrauger on Oakgrove. He will be resigning from the Planning Board so that I will be looking for someone who wishes to lend their intellect and reasoning to that Board.

Secondly, is the Planning Board's agenda for June 6th, its tentative agenda. It includes five items. One is the rearrangement of signs at 5409 Main Street. That's where the Point of View is. What they're going to do is amalgamate the signs of all the tenants in that one building and put them on one sign post. American Home Video, 5355 Main Street, formerly the Village Locksmith Shop. The Town of Amherst is before the Village Planning Board to request the permission to install a chain link fence on the east side of this building from the corner of the building to the back wall and over the wall to the creek. A fence is going up at 31 S. Cayuga and there is going to be an additional sign placed on the lawyers' offices at 5792 Main Street, John Sheffer's old building.

Looking through the motions tonight I have one and it deals with a public hearing. There has been some additional money received from Community development from refunds from HUD. We will have a public hearing on this on June 13th and that resolution reads:

Mayor Kuzon: Thank you. Next is Trustee Murray.

Trustee Murray: Thank you. This coming Monday will be the day, that's May 30th I believe, the Memorial day holiday, the Village

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Board of Trustees again will have their Third Annual Volunteer Appreciation Picnic. I hope those who are on committees here have received their invitations to a picnic that day that will begin at 5:00 PM. We hope that the three of you that are here will join us and ask your other committee members to come and join us that day. That's 5:00 PM after the parade.

I have two resolutions. The first one is to send the Chairman of the Traffic & Safety Committee to a conference.

ON MOTION by Trustee Murray, seconded by Trustee Saia, the following resolution was adopted:

Trustee Saia: I'll hold my report and go to my resolutions. No. 1:

We got opening dates for the parks. The parks will officially open, and Phil has, if you want to use the parks you can use them before that. We've had them partially open but today I think he's done more work on them. They'll be open officially May 30th. The pools for the kids will officially open June 20th. They will be ready at that time.

For my other report, at the last Village Board meeting I - after the meeting I was approached and it was said there was a statement made by Trustee Brenton which in reading it myself, reading the official minutes, I - there is room for me to doubt that there wasn't an implication that I was being untruthful or trying to get something for nothing. That's about it. And I know it was, I read it, naturally I read it, and I'd like Trustee Brenton to kind of explain his reason for making that statement and that's about it.

Trustee Brenton: I have to assume that the statement that you refer to is a statement that follows a particular segment of the public hearing held regarding a change in our sidewalk code. And then if

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my assumption is correct, as we discussed on the phone the other night and again in our work session tonight, what you're taking exception to is the fact that I said after, or rather after I discussed the reason for the change in the sidewalk code, and that was a discussion of some 20 sentences in length, and at the end of it I said that again my feeling is that if someone doesn't have a sidewalk they didn't want it for one reason or another. I would certainly think that that's a fair statement. Would you agree with that?

Trustee Saia: Go ahead.

Trustee Brenton: I feel I have to ask that. Whether the fact that I said my feeling is that if someone doesn't have a sidewalk they didn't want it for one reason or another. So that's what I said and obviously if someone doesn't have a sidewalk they probably didn't want it for one reason or another. At that time you said the Village wouldn't let me put a sidewalk in because of the trees, too, which I said I knew there was a reason. And then I said so is there any other public discussion, anyone else from the Board. So what you are taking exception to apparently, and someone in the audience also takes exception to, who is no doubt an expert on voice inflection, that when I said I knew there was a reason apparently what your objection is is that you feel that in fact you did have a reason. And as you indicated, the reason was that there were trees. So quite frankly I see no problem with this. However, if it strikes you for some reason as being some type of indication as to why you didn't have a sidewalk when your house was built that deviates from what you said that the trees were in the way, well then you have to take it that way. But as I said, these minutes are not only in written form. They are also tape recorded and I think if you went back and studied the tape you would find out that my vocal inflection was not as you yourself put it in our work session prior to this official public meeting. However, I have no problem with the statement I made. It simply is that I knew there was a reason, as you had previously indicated.

Trustee Saia: All right. You just indicated that 20 sentences before, and I go back to my copy of what was said that kind, and we discussed about, for instance "Trustee Brenton we've gone through this ordinance and I know we've got to do some work on it. But I didn't hear it mentioned about one-third or 51% for each new sidewalk. I didn't hear this before from anybody and I think this is something we should talk about." You said "whatever the Board determines" and then you go into this dissertation of all of this, of why you want it so that it don't pay for it. Now after that I said I think we should discuss it and you kept in there and then I said the Village wouldn't let me put a sidewalk in because of trees at my house and you said I knew there was a reason. And there's an implication there, Larry, and I've been called, I've been called looking out the window and I've been called every other, but I've

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never been called that I was untruthful or I was trying to get something for nothing.) Now I've been a volunteer fireman and donated my time to this Village, for nothing. What have you done for nothing?

Trustee Brenton: I've been on the Planning Board. I came to the Planning Board at your request. First the Youth Board, then to the Planning Board and then to the Village Board. That's what I've done for nothing. So I think I've spent an equal amount of time in the six years that I've served. However, I'm not going to argue this with you. I think if you do feel that I've impinged your reputation or your standing in this community you should contact your attorney. Thank you.

Mayor Kuzon: Anything else, Jim?

Trustee Saia: No.

Mayor Kuzon: Next is Mr. Bougreau, our Superintendent of Public Works.

Mr. Bougreau: Under the heading of Parks - Garrison: All recreational equipment was scraped, primed and painted this past week. Park benches have been fabricated and placed in the park. Light poles have been repaired and painted. Island Park: All recreational equipment was scraped, primed and painted this past week. Swings, teeter-totters, etc. were also repaired, filed and painted. Park benches have been fabricated and placed in the park. The comfort station has been updated with new towel dispensers, sinks and trash cans. The building is now ready for service. The areas needing reseeding have been measured up for work at a later date. Glen Park: General and small detail mowing of the grass was done this past week.

Under the heading of streets: A program for repaving and repair of streets is currently being considered. Some streets will be partially or totally repaved. Other streets on a case-by-case basis will be repaired. A number of existing manhole covers will be cut out, raised and repaved. This will be done in conjunction with our Sanitary Sewer Rehabilitation Program - Phase III, which will commence in June of this year. That's the end of my report, Mr. Mayor.

Mayor Kuzon: Thank you.

ON MOTION by Trustee Kibby, seconded by Trustee Murray, it was moved to suspend the rules for public participation.

Unanimously carried.

Mayor Kuzon: Anyone in the audience have anything this evening? Mr. Schueckler.

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Donald Schueckler, 124 S. Union: Number 1 - I heard this argument tonight over Lehn Lane. That was a proposed road that went from Main Street to Milton. It was never supposed to go to the Village garage. Legally that property the road is on now was donated by Mr. Long, if you look it up you'll find it, it was supposed to be for recreation only. No driveway. Since then the Village has put the garage in there. Nobody said nothing. Nobody cared. I just want to get the record straight. It don't go down that way. It only goes over to Milton Street, unless you changed it in the last six years. But, so I don't see anything - it looks fine to me. Number 1.

Number 2 - Larry, on this road marking on Cayuga Street, or Garrison, we watched this very closely. We were the culprits that did it. We marked it. We watched it and it seems that all I've heard from this Board is that everybody was out-of-towners went straight. We watched and took license numbers and found out the people live right in the area that went straight. The out-of-towners followed the arrows. So just - if they can't see the arrows, the people - two live right on Garrison. I could throw stones at their houses. One lives on Monroe and one lives on Columbia. They go right through it. So I can't understand why you're going to spend \$1,200 or \$1,500 to put a wire up in the air with signs when they can't see what's on the road. If they can't see that how are they going to see that up there? That's all I got to say.

Trustee Brenton: Well that's what I've said right along. I thank you very much for supporting me, Don, because obviously the Mayor and I were out-voted on that. And the signs, I'm afraid to say, are going to cost us considerably more than the \$1,500 you indicate and I think the Superintendent is going to have to be discussing this in depth in our work session and as I said at the time, my feeling was it's just throwing money at a problem and all the money you can throw at it that there's no way you're going to change it. I do think the arrows have helped. I really do think that the arrows have helped. I went down there today myself and they were backed up to where the road narrows and they're in the right hand lane and none of those people got out and went into the left hand lane that had no one in it. So that in effect may be kind of what you said. Maybe they were the out-of-towners that were all in the right hand lane. If you follow me. But they were doing what they should do. The left hand lane was vacant and I went right in the left hand lane and went right straight through. I had no trouble at all. No, I took a left.

Mr. Schueckler: You know the man on the corner, Van Brooks, if you put one on his front lawn stating it I think you'd have the problem ten times licked. Really I do. Then put overhead signs. It costs money and time. But it's up to you fellows. I know you can't see when there's snow on the ground. These people don't look for anything regardless of uphead, overhead. All they're interested in is going to work.

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Trustee Kibby: Don, that would be overkill, another sign there.

Mayor Kuzon: Okay. Anybody else? If not...

ON MOTION by Trustee Kibby, seconded by Trustee Brenton, it was moved to return to the regular agenda.

Unanimously carried.

Mayor Kuzon: If there's no further business...

ON MOTION by Mayor Kuzon, seconded by Trustee Murray, the meeting was adjourned at 8:14 PM.

Unanimously carried.
