Unanimously carried.

Trustee Sweeney reported that two plaques have been installed in the Activity Room. In November 1987, the Village Board dedicated the Activity Room in the memory of Jerome Nirschel, a long time Chairman of the Senior Citizen Committee who had a great deal to do with making that an effective and productive Committee. A plaque in his memory has been installed on the door. Inside the room a plaque has been mounted in honor of Mrs. Amy Mumm, one of our Senior Citizens members who has passed away.

ON MOTION by Trustee Sweeney, seconded by Trustee Bindert, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED THAT the following Village residents are hereby appointed members of the Williamsville Environmental Advisory Council until the end of the 1988 - 1989 official Village year:

ON MOTION by Trustee Sweeney, seconded by Trustee Bindert, it was moved to suspend rules to introduce a resolution which is not on the agenda.

Unanimously carried.

ON MOTION by Trustee Sweeney, seconded by Trustee Schlifke, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED THAT Mayor Brenton is authorized to retain additional counsel for professional services in the matter of the Centerpointe development.

Mayor Brenton explained that the Village Board has determined to seek outside legal assistance to defend the Village's position regarding the impact of the Centerpointe development as it will impact the Village of Williamsville. The Village Board did discuss this during an Executive Session during our work session.

Unanimously carried.

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ON MOTION by Trustee Sweeney, seconded by Trustee Kibby, it was moved to return to the regular agenda.

Unanimously carried.

ON MOTION by Trustee Bindert, seconded by Trustee Kibby, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED THAT Local Law #12-1988, Adding Section 60.40(3)(b) to the Village Traffic Code, which was the subject of a public hearing on August 22, 1988, and provides for a stop sign on Belmont and Arend, is hereby adopted.

Trustee Schlifke questioned whether there had been a request for the stop sign at this intersection by residents in the neighborhood or if it had been investigated by the Traffic and Safety Committee as a dangerous intersection. She wondered if any research had been done regarding accidents at that intersection. New York State law does not require stop signs at "T" intersections. The law states a vehicle must stop before entering these intersections. Also at the public hearing, no one spoke in favor of the stop sign. She wondered if this sign is necessary. Trustee Bindert stated that we are in the process of installing stop signs at all major "T" intersections. This particular one was brought up by Harmon Whipple who stated he was almost hit by a vehicle at this intersection. It was at the recommendation of the Traffic and Safety Committee that fourteen or fifteen of these "T" intersections were to be signed. We are presently on our third or fourth sign. Mayor Brenton stated he does not recall any recommendations in writing from the Traffic and Safety Committee but does remember the Village Board agreeing to the concept of signing the remaining "T" intersections. He explained that each sign costs about \$250 and even though the state law states these signs are not required they would add to the safety of our residents.

ON MOTION by Trustee Kibby, seconded by Trustee Schlifke, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED THAT Local Law #13-1988, Amending Section 70.10A of the Zoning Code dealing with Temporary Structures and Uses, which was the subject of a public hearing on August 22, 1988, is hereby adopted.

Unanimously carried.

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ON MOTION by Trustee Schlifke, seconded by Trustee Bindert, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED THAT Mayor Brenton is hereby authorized to sign the 1988-1989 STOP-DWI Contract between the Village of Williamsville and the County of Erie.

Unanimously carried.

Superintendent of Public Works Laubisch reported the following items:

1. The paving program was completed last Tuesday. The streets paved were California Drive, Park Drive, Milton Street, Rinewalt Street, School Street and Edward Street. The remedial work will be started this week. This includes driveway aprons and approaches at intersections.
2. Regarding the sidewalk program, the driveway aprons which were cut to install the new sidewalks will be rehabilitated starting this week.
3. A brochure has been received from the Erie County Compliance Services stating that the County is sponsoring for the people of Erie County a hazardous waste disposal cleanup day at the Erie County Highway Garage in the Town of Tonawanda on Saturday, September 17, 1988 from 9:00 A.M. to 2:00 P.M. Materials to be accepted include pesticides, herbicides in original labeled containers. They will also be accepting used motor oil and lead acid auto batteries. Also people will have to certify that the waste came from their households.

ON MOTION by Mayor Brenton, seconded by Trustee Schlifke, it was moved to suspend rules for public participation.

Unanimously carried.

Harmon Whipple, 54 Garden Parkway, stated he did request Trustee Bindert to look into a stop sign at Belmont and Arend because he almost had a collision at that intersection. The other car did not slow down. At the public hearing he thought the proposed stop sign had been approved by the Traffic and Safety Committee. That was why he did not speak at the public hearing. Mr. Whipple also stated there is a bad situation at the Long Street diamond. There are about fifty teenagers who congregate there and drink. It will take some law enforcement on a steady basis to break this up. Trustee Schlifke stated she will be in touch with the Amherst police and ask for a regular patrol.

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Elroy Avery, 75 Rinewalt Street, asked when the driveway repair would be completed. He also asked why the streets were not completed to the curbs. In some cases, six inches were left unpaved. Superintendent Laubisch stated in some areas where there are no curbs, the streets were paved in varying widths. It is difficult to maintain a good grade when there are different lengths. Mr. Avery was concerned that in some areas there may be a drop off of three inches which could cause a liability problem if someone was hurt. Perhaps some asphalt could be placed there.

Clifford Horey, 106 Highland Avenue, asked whether the stop sign at Arend and Belmont was one stop sign from Arend onto Belmont or three stop signs. Trustee Bindert stated it was one stop sign.

Mary Avery, 64 Garrison Road, asked when College Park was being proposed whether the Village had any input on that or was it just Homeowners Groups. Mayor Brenton stated he could not recall any special input requested of the Village for that project. The Planning Board requests input at the public hearings and that is the place where municipalities and residents have to express their opinions.

ON MOTION by Mayor Brenton, seconded by Trustee Kibby, it was moved to return to the regular agenda.

Unanimously carried.

ON MOTION by Mayor Brenton, seconded by Trustee Schlifke, it was moved to close the meeting at 8:12 P.M.

ON MOTION by Mayor Brenton, seconded by Trustee Schlifke, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED THAT Village Clerk, Theresa L. Cummins, and Superintendent of Public Works, David Laubisch, are hereby authorized to attend the New York State Government Finance Officers Association Seminar in Syracuse, New York, on October 20-21, 1988, and the cost, not to exceed \$125 each, to be paid by the Village of Williamsville.

ON MOTION by Mayor Brenton, seconded by Trustee Bindert, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED THAT David Laubisch, Superintendent of Public Works, is hereby authorized to attend the Highway Superintendents School in Saratoga Springs, New York, from October 24 — 27, 1988, and the cost, not to exceed \$500, to be paid by the Village of Williamsville.

ON MOTION by Mayor Brenton, seconded by Trustee Bindert, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED THAT Trustee Richard Sweeney is hereby appointed the Village of Williamsville representative to the Northeast Solid Waste Board, and Superintendent of Public Works, David Laubisch is appointed the alternate representative.

Unanimously carried.

Mayor Brenton explained that the following resolution deals with the concern the Village has with the Centerpointe development. This has been on-going situation where the Village Board has spent a great deal of time and effort to protect the Village interest. The Village is, therefore, retaining counsel for any legal advice that may be necessary throughout this situation.

ON MOTION by Mayor Brenton, seconded by Trustee Schlifke, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED THAT Milton Kaplan is hereby appointed

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Special Counsel for the Village of Williamsville effective September 15, 1988, at the rate of \$100.00 per hour, for the purpose of offering legal counsel and assistance to the Village Board relating to the impact upon the Village of the proposed Centerpointe Development.

Trustee Bindert stated that although he is in favor of obtaining legal counsel, there is a question with Milton Kaplan. He is very capable; however, he is a member of the law firm of Magavern & Magavern. Larry Woodward, who is a member of this firm, is the husband of Jean Woodward, a member of the Town Planning Board. Therefore, Milton Kaplan would be somewhat limited by conflict of interest to represent the Village of Williamsville in all litigation.

Vote on Roll Call: Trustee Kibby, Aye; Trustee Sweeney, Aye; Trustee Schlifke, Aye; Trustee Bindert, No; and Mayor Brenton, Aye;

ON MOTION by Mayor Brenton, seconded by Trustee Schlifke, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED THAT Dolores A. Rataczak, 134 North Ellicott Street, is hereby appointed Water Meter Reader, P.T., effective September 27, 1988 at the rate of \$5.00 per hour.

Unanimously carried.

Trustee Bindert reported that last week he sent a letter to the State Department of Transportation regarding the "No Right on Red Sign" at Main and Cayuga asking them to place a sign overhead due to limited visibility at that intersection.

Trustee Kibby reported that the Chairman of the Planning Board has instituted several changes which will be of interest to petitioners for Planning Board approval. There will be a pre-meeting which will be attended by the Building Department Administrator, the Building Inspector, the Planning Board Chairman and occasionally the Liaison to the Planning Board. They will discuss the items on the agenda to make sure all items are available for that night's meeting and that any action requested is perfectly legal. If there are any questions, the item will be removed from the agenda at that time and postponed until the following meeting.

Mayor Kibby also reported that for the past five years, the Village has been working on a revision of the Village Codes.

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The sections completed to date are the Building Code, Demolition of Buildings, Unsafe Buildings, Fences, Flood Damage Prevention, Historical Preservation, Park Regulations, Peddlers and Hawkers, and Signs. Parts needing to be done yet are Zoning, Streets, Sidewalks, Sewer Use, Swimming Pools and Dogs.

Trustee Schlifke reported on the progress of the Bike/Walk Trail which is being developed on the Conrail property which the Village purchased about five years ago. The grading for the trail and the parking area on South Long Street have been done. The paving will begin as soon as Superintendent Laubisch can arrange his work force. This is probably as far as we will go this fall, except for perhaps a little more clean up work. The balance will be completed in the spring.

ON MOTION by Trustee Schlifke, seconded by Trustee Bindert, the following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS the Village of Williamsville has advertised for sealed bids for the Construction of a Pavilion in Island Park, and,

WHEREAS all bids opened by the Village Clerk on September 9, 1988, exceeded the estimated cost of the proposed construction as submitted by the architect,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that all bids received on September 9, 1988, for the construction of a Pavilion in Island Park are hereby rejected.

Unanimously carried.

Trustee Sweeney had no report and no resolutions.

Superintendent of Public Works Laubisch reminded the residents that on September 30th, the two garbage pickups will end. From October 1st thru May 1989, the pickup is only on Mondays. Also, trash pickup ends the week of October 24th for this season. Trash pickups are made during the winter months but only by phone request.

The Williamsville Fire Department Fire Prevention Bureau consisting of Evor Williams, Joseph Greer and Herbert Stoeckl presented a report of their activities for the period of 1985-1987. (A copy of their report is attached.) Mr. Williams announced that Fire Prevention Open House will be on Saturday October 8th from 1:00-4:00 P.M. at Station #2 at which time fire equipment and first aid techniques would be demonstrated.

ON MOTION by Mayor Brenton, seconded by Trustee Schlifke, it was moved to suspend rules for public participation.

Unanimously carried.

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Mary Anne Avery, 64 Garrison Road, commended the Mayor for his spirited defense of the Village in front of the Town Planning Department.

Ken Schmieder, 19 Wellington Court, President of the Wellington Court Homeowners Association, presented the Board with a petition requesting the Board to reconsider the requirement for a sidewalk in front of Buildings #5, #6, and #7 of the subdivision. (A copy of the petition is attached.)

Bob Wnek, 5 Wellington Court, quoted from a letter from Mayor Brenton to the Wellington Court Association. "A primary concern was the fact that this sidewalk may very well be used by pedestrians who may be walking thru the general area from California to Cayuga." Mr. Wnek stated there is no public access from California to Wellington Court so he doesn't see the rationale of the Board in making that statement. Also the only real people this sidewalk will affect are the residents of Wellington Court. Overwhelmingly the residents have voted not to be in favor of the sidewalks so they would like to see the Board change their opinion on the sidewalks.

Trustee Kibby stated he has never been called "fictitious". He walks that street about five times a week through Hirsch's property down Wellington to Cayuga. When the developer came to the Village Board for approval of her project, she agreed to build the sidewalks. This was one of the stipulations very clearly enunciated by this Board to her and to anyone who builds anything in this community anymore is that there will be sidewalks on Cayuga and there will be sidewalks on Wellington. There was no argument and no disagreement.

Residents questioned if no consideration could be made to the residents who were not aware of the agreement and who do not want the sidewalks.

Trustee Kibby stated the commitment was made several years ago.

Mayor Brenton stated that the construction at Wellington was done under "Exceptional Development". All of the construction and site plans were approved explicitly by this Village Board. This is not the normal procedure, but in the case of a project of this magnitude the Village Board becomes involved. Anything which was done is now a resolved fact on the part of this Board. In order to do anything other than what was resolved would require another public hearing and resolution. The Board has no intention of changing any portion of that development at this point. The Board understands the residents' concerns but he does not feel the Board has any intention of changing any of the requirements for the development.

Jerome Scherer, 55 Wellington Court, asked if Trustee Kibby has anything against Wellington Court which makes the Board not

WHEREAS, the undersigned are residents of the Village of Williamsville, residing in detached and attached units in the Wellington Court Subdivision; and

WHEREAS, it is the understanding of the undersigned that the Village of Williamsville has directed the developer of the Wellington Court Subdivision to construct a side walk along the entire frontage of the Wellington Court Subdivision along Wellington Court; and

WHEREAS, the undersigned believe that there are adequate sidewalks servicing the dwelling units in the subdivision; and

WHEREAS, Wellington Court is a dead-end street with no dwelling units on the north side of the street between Wellington Court Subdivision and the end of the street; and

WHEREAS, there are only private properties along Wellington Court; and

WHEREAS, the construction of sidewalks in the front of Buildings No. 5, 6 and 7 of the subdivision as presently required by the Village of Williamsville may necessitate the removal of four (4) large trees which are important to the aesthetics of the subdivision; and

WHEREAS, an exception already has been granted for a different portion of sidewalk along Wellington Court; and

WHEREAS, this would not be the first abridgement of the exceptional development process.

NOW THEREFORE, the undersigned hereby petition the Village of Williamsville to eliminate from its requirements, the obligation that the developer of the Wellington Court Subdivision construct a sidewalk for the entire length of the frontage of the subdivision on Wellington Court so that the developer will not be required to construct sidewalks between the division and the sidewalk entry to the most southerly unit in Building No. 5 in the subdivision.

Minutes of the Regular Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Williamsville held in the Williamsville Village Hall, 5565 Main Street, Williamsville, New York on Monday, September 26, 1988 at 7:32 P.M.

consent to the residents, which are a great number. He wonders why the Board will not give in to their request. He has lived in the Village for twenty years on Garrison Road. There are no sidewalks on portions of that road, or on Scott. Why are those streets left undone and the Board is so insistent that sidewalks be placed on a dead end street. He doesn't understand the reasoning. Just because it was in the plans — plans can be changed.

Trustee Sweeney stated he was not a member of the Board when the Exceptional Development went through, but being a member of the Environmental Committee, arguing for green space, reducing density and making Wellington Court a part of the community by connecting it with roadways and walkways that are safe and useable by all members of the community and not to set aside this part of Williamsville as a little enclave separate unto itself. We wanted to connect it and make it someplace where someone might want to jog. His own feeling, which he has argued unsuccessfully with the Board, is to go throughout the Village and put sidewalks on Scott and on Garrison where there are none now. This, to him, is an attempt to put sidewalks throughout the Village where re-development and new money is going in to change the complexion of the Village. This is part of a masterplan to put sidewalks everywhere. This is part of a village atmosphere — the ability to walk from one area to another.

Jerome Scherer, 55 Wellington Court, stated that there are sidewalks on one side of the street if someone wants to take a long walk. Why take away greenery which the Village is always stressing?

Trustee Kibby stated his own neighbors are still mad at him that this development was built. They think of him as a leading proponent of the development. He now has a problem with the fact that someone comes in and says "I will do A, B and C, if you will do X, Y and Z." and then she comes back and says I don't want to do "A" now. That is fraud. You said you would put sidewalks there. The Village Board has a policy that nothing gets built without a sidewalk. The streets you point to, Garrison and Cayuga, are the reasons that nothing now gets built without a sidewalk.

Nancy Schmieder, 19 Wellington Court, stated they are not coming as representatives of the developer. They were not privy to the hours of discussions the Village Board had with the developer. They are a separate group of people who live there. She does not know what went on with the developer in terms of sidewalks. She is somewhat insulted that the term "fraud" now comes up in these discussions with members of the community who have a complaint. She is somewhat resentful that the Board has decided ahead of time that they will not listen to the residents.

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Mayor Brenton stated that sidewalks are for public safety and he believes their group, as a body, requested that sidewalks be installed on Cayuga Road. He finds it somewhat difficult to equate their concern for safety on Cayuga Road and with their not wanting sidewalks on Wellington. The bottom line is that now when people build in the Village of Williamsville, this Board has made a determination that the construction will be accompanied by sidewalks. The Board appreciates their coming here this evening and takes your concern for installation of sidewalks with deep regard. The Board would hope the residents would understand the Board's concern for public safety and for our policy which is now imposed throughout the Village of Williamsville. About 4/5 of the Village now have had their sidewalks rehabilitated. This shows the determination of this Board to assure that people can walk throughout the community in a safe manner. The Village has paid 50% of the cost of this rehabilitation. This shows the sincerity of our concern for public safety.

Jerome Scherer asked if this could be deferred somehow for two years to see how this works out. If there are complaints from residents cutting through or wanting to take short cuts or wanting to walk to the dead end of Wellington Court that they can't walk on one side of the street, can we wait two years to see the results. This seems reasonable to the residents and also to the Board.

Mayor Brenton stated the requirements of Exceptional Development are long and complicated as it applied to their development. In order to delete this one item would require public hearings, etc. and it could not be postponed for two years. More than likely it won't be postponed much longer. The Building Inspector is here and the time for installing concrete is quickly running out. It is the Board's feeling that this should be done. If it isn't there would probably be some constraints on future development and certificates of occupancy.

Mary Lowther, 122 Chalmers Street, thanked the Mayor and the Board for the resolution this evening to hire outside counsel regarding the Centerpointe development.

ON MOTION by Mayor Brenton, seconded by Trustee Schlifke, it was moved to return to the regular agenda.

Unanimously carried.

ON MOTION by Mayor Brenton, seconded by Trustee Schlifke, the meeting was closed at 8:30 P.M.
