

Minutes of the Public Hearing of the Board of Trustees of the Village of
Williamsville held in the Williamsville Village Hall, 5565 Main Street,
Williamsville, New York on Monday, March 26, 1990 at 7:41 P.M.

The Clerk read the notice of public hearing being held for the purpose of hearing all persons interested in discussing the Proposed Rezoning of the existing residentially developed lots located on the east side of Reist Street between Glen Avenue and West Spring Street from C-2 to R-3.

Trustee Sweeney stated the Village Board received a petition from residents asking for a rezoning of their property. The Board examined the map, sent the petition of the residents to the Planning Board, the Environmental Advisory and Traffic and Safety Committees asking them for advisory opinions. They discussed the proposal and we determined that we should go forward with this public hearing on the proposed rezoning. The subject of the resolution addresses a change in zoning from C-2 to R-3 whereas the petition of the residents talks about a possible rezoning from C-2 to R-2 or R-3. Other than that difference, the Board is holding a public hearing on a request by Village residents for rezoning of their property.

Jenny Dorazine, 29 Reist Street, organizer and spokeswoman for the group, stated they are requesting that the Board rezone their properties from the present commercial classification to a residential classification which will be consistent with the established land use. She has spoken with Trustee Sweeney and Trustee Kaye, who have been very helpful. They ask the Board support them. They feel this is a positive step towards maintaining the residential character of their Village neighborhood.

Trustee Sweeney questioned the audience if there ~~(was)~~ anyone against the proposed zoning change.

There was no comment from the audience.

Trustee Sweeney asked the clerk if there was a specific mailing to the adjoining property owners of the proposed zoning change.

Theresa Cummins stated there was no mailing. The proposal was just advertised.

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Trustee Sweeney questioned the audience if there was anyone in the audience who was in favor of the proposed zoning change. The petition is signed by 9 residents of the Village.

Jenny Vorazine stated she told some of her neighbors about this meeting and some could not attend.

Trustee Bindert stated he lives on Garden Parkway. Up until about a year or so back, their property was zoned commercial. He does have commercial property abutting his property in the back. He knows what they experience when they are in this type of an area. There are 2 sides to looking at it. First, the homes will be stabilized since all the houses in the area will be zoned residential. On the other side the property might be worth more money. If it has that commercial zoning it can be turned into a business. By the same token, then you further deteriorate what happens to the other properties in the area. It's a question he is sure that has been thought of before the petitions were circulated.

Trustee Kaye said it is her understanding that all of the property owners wish to have this rezoning. They all wish to have the residential character of their street to remain intact.

Jenny Vorazine stated there is an elderly woman that lives to the south of her who was fearful of signing it without her son's advice. She is the only one that didn't sign the petition.

Mayor Brenton stated it would be very important that we have this woman's acquiescence to this proposal.

Ms. Vorazine stated she had spoken to Trustee Sweeney about it because the overall feeling of the residents was positive. But she understands what Mayor Brenton was saying.

Mayor Brenton questioned whether it would be legal to rezone her property without her acquisition or if we could find ourselves in court over the matter.

Attorney Troy stated it is already a residential facility that she is living in. It is a home. She really isn't losing anything except some vague potential commercial possibility. Failure to state any opposition wouldn't make any difference.

Trustee Sweeney stated that there was a map in the Amherst Bee along with the notice of the proposed area. He thinks that that petition, with the items in evidence, speak for themselves.

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ON MOTION by Trustee Sweeney, seconded by Trustee Bindert, it was moved
to close the public hearing at 7:50 P.M.

ON MOTION by Mayor Brenton, seconded by Trustee Sweeney, the minutes of
the regular meeting of the Board of Trustees held March 12, 1990 were
approved.

ON MOTION by Mayor Brenton, seconded by Trustee Daniels, the minutes of
the public hearing -Proposed Local Law - Repeal current Landscape Law and
Adopt new Chapter 24.00 entitled "Landscaping" - held March 12, 1990 were
approved.

Unanimously carried.

ON MOTION by Mayor Brenton, seconded by Trustee Sweeney, the minutes of
the public hearing -Proposed Local Law- Repeal current Traffic Ordinances
and Adopt new chapter 60.00 entitled "Vehicles and Traffic" held March
12, 1990 were approved.

Unanimously carried.

ON MOTION by Trustee Sweeney, seconded by Trustee Bindert, it was moved
at 7:41 P.M. to open a public hearing to discuss the Proposed Rezoning of
the existing residentially developed lots located on the east side of
Reist Street between Glen Avenue and West Spring Street from C-2 to R-3
(The public hearing was closed at 7:50 P.M.)

Unanimously carried.

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Mayor Brenton called everyone's attention to the fact that census forms
have been mailed by the Census Bureau. He urged everyone to complete the
forms and mail them by April 1st.

Mayor Brenton stated he has received a letter from Commissioner Jorling
of the D.E.C. indicating it is a wonderful idea to return money to
wildlife in the form of a gift to wildlife. This can be done on your New
York State income tax return, if you are so inclined.

ON MOTION by Mayor Brenton, seconded by Trustee Bindert, vouchers in the

ON MOTION by Mayor Brenton, seconded by Trustee Bindert, the following
resolution was hereby adopted:

RESOLVED THAT the Village Clerk publish a notice of public
hearing to be held April 9, 1990 at 7:30 P.M. in the Village
Hall, 5565 Main Street, Williamsville, New York, for the purpose
of hearing all persons interested in discussing the 1990-1991
General Fund, Water Fund, Sewer Fund, Glen Park Activities Fund,
and Debt Service Fund Budgets.

Mayor Brenton stated that this hearing covers about 3/4 of all the monies
that will be spent by the Village of Williamsville in the upcoming fiscal
year.

Unanimously carried.

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ON MOTION by Mayor Brenton, seconded by Trustee Daniels, the following
resolution was hereby adopted:

RESOLVED THAT the Village Clerk publish a notice of public
hearing to be held April 9, 1990 at 7:35 P.M. in the Village
Hall, 5565 Main Street, Williamsville, New York, for the purpose
of hearing all persons interested in expressing an opinion on the
proposed sewer rent rates for the 1990-1991 year per Section
41.20 (D) of the Sewer Rent Code.

Unanimously carried.

Trustee Daniels stated he has 2 resolutions. The first one deals with
recycling efforts as part of the Northeast Solid Waste Board. This is a
14 member Board. The Board is presently purchasing a facility on Walden
Avenue. The Village of Depew is going to be the lead agency in
purchasing this facility. All the members will contribute financially to
it's purchase with the understanding that it will be refurbished into a
recycling facility which will accept all of our recyclable goods,
plastics, metal, bottles and paper in the future. As part of this Board
we will be able to obtain much lower costs for the garbage disposal due
to the fact that all these items will be recycled. The Village of
Williamsville's tentative start-up date for recycling is September 1,
1990. This facility however won't be on line until probably a year from
now. We are getting a jump on it. When the facility does go on line we
will be able to take our recyclable commodities there. Due to the resale
value of those commodities we will be able to lower the cost of
collecting the garbage for Village residents. The Village Board's
commitment to the facility is represented in the percentage that we have
population wise in this 14 community group which is approximately 2.4%.
The Village of Williamsville will be contributing 2.4% to the purchase
price of this facility. That contribution % is dependent on the number
of the 14 members of the coalition who join. The contribution will be
between \$5,580 and up to \$7,812 per year for a maximum of 2 years on the
negotiated agreement to signed with the E.C.I.D.A.

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ON MOTION by Trustee Daniels, seconded by Trustee Sweeney, the following
resolution was hereby adopted:

RESOLUTION: TO COMMIT FUNDS FOR PAYMENT OF A SHARE OF AN
ANNUAL LEASE, TO ENABLE THE ERIE COUNTY INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT
AGENCY ("ECIDA") TO PURCHASE A BUILDING FOR FUTURE DEVELOPMENT AS
A NORTHEAST BOARD RECYCLING FACILITY.

WHEREAS as a member of the Northeast Communities Solid
Waste Management Board, the VILLAGE OF WILLIAMSVILLE has been
considering the joint development of a recycling facility that
would benefit the Northeast Board municipalities; and

WHEREAS, State law requires all local municipalities to
mandate the source separation of recyclable materials, by
enacting local laws to that effect on or before September 1, 1992;

WHEREAS, every ton recycled is one less ton that needs to
be disposed; and

WHEREAS, the joint undertaking of a Northeast Board
recycling facility will provide a local facility that can accept
deliveries of recyclable materials that are source separated by
our residents; and

WHEREAS, an existing warehouse building located at 3327
Walden Avenue in Depew has been identified as the preferred
location for a Northeast Board recycling facility, and the
proposed development of a Northeast Board recycling facility at
said location has been reviewed pursuant to the requirements of
the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA") with the
Village of Depew designated as the SEQRA Lead Agency; and

WHEREAS, the ECIDA has offered to purchase aforesaid
property and lease it back to the Northeast Board municipalities;
and

WHEREAS, the ECIDA needs to receive sufficient funding
commitments from the Northeast Board municipalities before
it will purchase aforesaid property on behalf of the Northeast
Board; and

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WHEREAS, if sufficient funding commitments are made by the various Northeast Board municipalities, then a lease agreement and other contractual arrangements will be developed, as deemed necessary and appropriate to accomplish toe ECIDA's financing of the property transaction, and the Village of Williamsville will be a party to said lease agreement and other contractual arrangements, if any; and

WHEREAS, said lease agreement will determine the actual amount and schedule of payments to be made by the VILLAGE OF WILLIAMSVILLE; and

WHEREAS, the VILLAGE OF WILLIAMSVILLE is desirous of participating in the development of the proposed Northeast Board recycling facility;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT:

RESOLVED, that the VILLAGE OF WILLIAMSVILLE hereby agrees to contribute at least \$5,580 and up to \$7,812 in 1990, and each year thereafter in accordance with and for so long as such payments are required under the terms of a 2 year lease agreement to be negotiated among the Erie County Industrial Development Agency, the VILLAGE OF WILLIAMSVILLE, and other Northeast Board municipalities; and

RESOLVED, that aforesaid funding commitment will not be withdrawn, annulled, revoked or otherwise reduced, unless written notification to the contrary is received from the Chairman of the Northeast Communities Solid Waste Management Board as a result of insufficient funding commitments being provided by the various Northeast Board municipalities; and

RESOLVED, that certified copies of this resolution shall be forwarded to the Erie County Industrial Development Agency, the Chairman of the Northeast Communities Solid Waste Management Board, and the Mayor of the Village of Depew.

Unanimously carried.

Trustee Daniels stated his second resolution has to do with the Fire Department whose aim is to have about 60 active Firemen. In order to keep the ranks at an effective level, they are asking that 2 more people be approved for membership.

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ON MOTION by Trustee Daniels, seconded by Trustee Sweeney, the following
resolution was hereby adopted:

RESOLVED THAT the Village of Williamsville Board of Trustees,
acting as Fire Commissioners for the Williamsville Fire
Department hereby appoints Adam F. Kubiak and David A. Kubiak,
325 Seigfried, as Firemen in the Williamsville Fire Department.

Unanimously carried.

Trustee Kaye reported she will be looking in the very near future for
Pool Attendants at Island and Garrison Park. If anyone is looking for
summer employment from Memorial Day through Labor Day, who is over 18
years old, they should come to the Village Hall to fill out an
application for Pool Attendant. We do the actual training through the
Red Cross lifesaving course here and the Village does pay for it.

Trustee Kaye also reported that she as Liaison to the DPW and Dave
Laubisch, Supt. of Public Works, went this past week to Syracuse for New
York State's first annual recycling conference that was sponsored by the
D.E.C. It was a tremendous wealth of information. As Trustee Daniels
spoke earlier, the Village is moving quickly towards recycling and
starting up on September 1st. A great deal of information was received
regarding source separation. Our Village recommendations and goals are
very similar to those of the E.P.A. and D.E.C.'s regarding looking at 25%
recycling of all waste by 1992 and 50% by the year 2000. We will be
starting that source separation as of September 1st. There was a great
deal of discussion everywhere from marketing those goods to what actually
happens to them, to visiting a recovery plant as proposed by the
Northeast Solid Waste Board, that we just voted on. Vendors were there
to show what kinds of products that will be made from those recycled
products. The D.P.W. facility and our parks this year have moved to
using all recycled paper products with the office to be soon following as
the present supply of paper goods diminishes. So we are moving to use
all recycled paper within the Village and the facilities as well.

Trustee Kaye stated most of her resolutions do deal with garbage pickup
and recycling since the Village is working very diligently to have waste
minimization and have cost avoidance to taxpayers. Her first resolution
calls for bids for a truck chassis and packer body that would be used
beginning June 1st for the Village collection of garbage. We are going
into picking up our own garbage. When we analyzed all of the costs from
the bids that came in recently, we realized that we could have a savings
of approximately \$65,000 to our Village residents which really is an
equivalent to about 33 cents per thousand of assessed evaluation.

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We diligently wanted to pass as many cost savings onto the residents as
we could. In looking at all the options, we felt that this was a prudent
way to do it.

ON MOTION by Trustee Kaye, seconded by Trustee Bindert, the following
resolution was hereby adopted:

RESOLVED THAT the Village Clerk advertise for sealed bids for
one truck chassis and 32 yard packer body for the Department of
Public Works. Bids to be opened at 10:00 A.M. on April 6, 1990
in the Village Clerk's Office, 5565 Main Street, Williamsville,
New York, under the terms of the standard bidding resolution.

Unanimously carried.

Trustee Kaye stated the Board will be sending out notices in mid May to
all residents because we will be changing garbage collection days.
Rather than garbage being collected on Mondays throughout the Village, we
will be having 4 different collection days, Tuesday - Friday. Residents
will be notified of their new garbage collection day.

Trustee Kaye stated her second resolution calls for bids for recycling
containers. Superintendent David Laubisch has the actual container to
show you in his portion of the agenda. We will distribute one container
per living unit. If you need additional containers, there will be a
slight fee of \$5.00 for each unit. However, research has shown that the
size which we are purchasing will hold an entire week's worth of
recyclables per household. The recyclable specs that we have also
mandate that portion of these recycling containers actually be made out
of recycled plastic.

ON MOTION by Trustee Kaye, seconded by Trustee Bindert, the following
resolution was hereby adopted:

RESOLVED THAT the Village Clerk advertise for sealed bids for
3,000 recycling containers. Bids to be opened at 2:00 P.M. on April
18, 1990 in the Village Clerk's Office, 5565 Main Street,
Williamsville, New York, under the terms of the standard bidding
resolution.

Unanimously carried.

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Trustee Kaye stated her third resolution is to authorize the Mayor to submit a recycling grant application to the state. We are looking at a grant application for the Village for source separation funding under Article 51 of the Environmental Quality Bond Act, Title 5, Solid Waste Recovery and Management Sections 280 through 283. We are requesting \$60,000 from the state for the recycling project for payment for the equipment to start the recycling.

ON MOTION by Trustee Kaye, seconded by Trustee Bindert, the following resolution was hereby adopted:

Resolution Authorizing the Filing of an Application for a State Grant-In-Aid for Resource Recovery and/or Source Separation Equipment for a Municipal Solid Waste Management Project and Signing of the Associated State Contract, Under the Appropriate Laws of New York State.

WHEREAS, the State of New York provides financial aid for resource recovery equipment, source separation equipment, or both, for the implementation of small scale, low-technology approaches to resource recovery; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Williamsville herein called the MUNICIPALITY, has examined and duly considered the applicable laws of the State of New York and the MUNICIPALITY deems it to be in the public interest and benefit to file an application under these laws; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary that a Contract by and between THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK, herein called STATE, and the MUNICIPALITY be executed for such STATE Aid;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY the Board of Trustees of the Village of Williamsville:

1. That the filing of an application in the form required by the State of New York in conformity with the applicable laws of the State of New York including all understanding and assurances contained in said application is hereby authorized.

2. That Lawrence R. Brenton, Mayor, is directed and authorized as the official representative of the MUNICIPALITY to act in connection with the application and to provide such additional information as may be required and to sign the resulting contract if said application is approved by the STATE;

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3. That the MUNICIPALITY agrees that it will fund its
portion of the cost of said Solid Waste Management Project.

4. That five (5) Certified Copies of this Resolution be
prepared and sent to the NEW YORK STATE DEPARTMENT OF
ENVIRONMENTAL CONSERVATION, ALBANY, NEW YORK 12233-4015, together
with a complete application.

5. That this resolution shall take effect immediately.

Trustee Sweeney wondered if the Board is still proceeding in cooperation
with the Northeast Board as we had discussed previously making a joint
application as part of the Board for some reimbursement. Do we still
have an active grant application through the Board?

Trustee Kaye stated the Board has not submitted a grant application as
yet.

Mayor Brenton stated this is for the equipment that the Village of
Williamsville would use. The Northeast Solid Waste Board was to secure
funds that are available for like Boards throughout the state. That's
the difference. This is for the Village and what the Northeast Solid
Waste Board may obtain from the state is totally separate. It pertains
to the Northeast Solid Waste Board's needs and not to individual
municipalities comprising that Board.

Trustee Daniels stated it is his understanding that the Northeast Solid
Waste Board is pursuing that grant application which would apply to this
type of equipment for each municipality within it's Board. He would like
a clarification on that as well and if we can apply under both venues, he
would like to see that happen.

Superintendent David Laubisch stated the Northeast Board is in the
process of hiring an agency to complete their application. When he
talked to John Finster last week, Mr. Finster informed us that we should
go ahead and file our own application and then down the road if they do
file an application we could address it at that time.

Trustee Bindert commented that at this recycling seminar that Trustee
Kaye went to in Syracuse, the press reports that there was a promise of
additional funds coming from state government to help municipalities as
ourselves and others to put this program in gear. However, this
application for funds is for already existing funds and the other is in
the future hopefully to offset some of the costs that we will be
incurring. Is that correct?

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Mayor Brenton stated that is partially correct. The Northeast Solid
Waste Board also deals with funds that are available. The significance
of going this way is if we had processed our own application a year ago
we might have had funding already. Instead we were going through the
Northeast Solid Waste Board and somehow that application did not get
processed. We lost an initial opportunity for 50% funding. We relied on
the Northeast Solid Waste Board in order to do that for us. For some
reason or another, it was not accomplished. This way here, we do it for
ourselves. We take rapid advantage of any funds that might be available.

Trustee Kaye stated we have been encouraged to submit our application.
We also have been in contact with Senator Sheffer's office as well. At
the conference that we did attend in Syracuse, it was very positive and
upbeat about funding.

Unanimously carried.

Trustee Kaye stated her fourth resolution is to call for a public hearing
to make the appropriate amendments to the refuse law sections of our
code. Basically, as of September 1st, the community will have to break
out the recyclables. The definitions of these recyclables, glass,
plastic, newspaper and tin will be made part of our actual code. The
garbage day will also be changed from 1 to 4 days and the appropriate
enforcement measures will be included.

ON MOTION by Trustee Kaye, seconded by Trustee Bindert, the following
resolution was hereby adopted:

RESOLVED THAT the Village Clerk publish notice of public
hearing to be held by the Board of Trustees of the Village of
Williamsville on April 23, 1990 at 7:30 P.M. in the Village Hall,
5565 Main Street, Williamsville, New York, for the purpose of
hearing all persons discuss proposed amendments to Chapter 17.00
-Refuse- which would incorporate recycling provisions.

Unanimously carried.

Trustee Kaye stated her last resolution is calling for a public hearing to
designate the train station on S. Long, the Lehigh Station, for status as
a historical building. The Western New York Railroad Historical Society
has been working very diligently on that building. They have submitted
their application and requested that we go ahead and have that building
designated as a landmark. Their records indicate the station was built
in 1895. The historical evaluation talks about the various uses of the
building. They are very excited about going ahead with this designation
and are very positive about it. They are doing quite a bit to raise
funds to restore the railroad station to it's original splendor.

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ON MOTION by Trustee Kaye, seconded by Trustee Bindert, the following
resolution was hereby adopted:

RESOLVED THAT the Village Clerk publish notice of public
hearing to be held by the Board of Trustees on April 23, 1990 at
7:35 P.M. for the purpose of hearing all persons interested in
discussing the proposal that the Williamsville Train Station
located on S. Long Street near the Lehigh Memory Trail be
designated as a historical landmark in the Village of Williamsville.

Unanimously carried.

Trustee Sweeney stated he has no significant activity to report on the
code enforcement or Code Review Committees.

Trustee Bindert stated he has no report this evening.

ON MOTION by Trustee Bindert, seconded by Trustee Sweeney, the following
resolution was hereby adopted:

RESOLVED THAT Gordon L. Compo, 9217 Main Street #2, Clarence
New York, is hereby appointed Seasonal Laborer in the Glen Park
effective March 26, 1990 at the rate of \$4.50 per hour. Funds to
come from the Glen Park Joint Activities Fund.

Trustee Daniels questioned since we normally give preference to any
Village residents he assumes that not one from the Village applied for
this job.

Trustee Bindert stated he did advertise for this position for
approximately 2-2 1/2 months. He did interview a couple of people from
the Town. There was another position that was filled, which was not
seasonal in nature but year round and was filled by a Village resident.
This individual seemed eager and anxious to pursue the position. That's
what you need is a little enthusiasm out there.

Unanimously carried.

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ON MOTION by Trustee Bindert, seconded by Trustee Sweeney, the following
resolution was hereby adopted:

RESOLVED THAT the Community Development Block Grant Funds for
Federal fiscal year 1990 are hereby allocated as follows:

Trustee Daniels stated this Community Development Block Grant fund money
has a number of applications anywhere from rehabilitating the Meeting
House to putting in new waterlines. He would recommend that in the
housing rehabilitation \$8,000 allocation, the Board be open to the
suggestion of smoke detectors for qualifying senior citizens. He's not
putting a dollar amount on it. He thinks it's being done for the first
time this year in Amherst and a benefit to the senior citizens, retired
people, people who are unable to afford a smoke detector. They are hard
wired so the batteries don't have to be changed by people who are physically
unable to do that. He would like it on record that the suggestion of
smoke detectors for that purpose be a possible option in housing
rehabilitation allotment.

Unanimously carried.

Superintendent David Laubisch stated that the Village of Williamsville
will start recycling September 1, 1990. Superintendent Laubisch showed
the audience the type of container that will be used. It will say
"Williamsville Recycles" and will also have a place on it where the
resident's address will be marked in case the container gets blown down
the street. Part of our bid specification states that a minimum of 10%
of this container should be recycled material. This encourages the
markets to develop, utilize and recycle plastics that are being returned.
It will also aid in the recycling program. Some of the figures that were
mentioned earlier include the Environment Quality Bond Act in 1988
requiring the Village of Williamsville by 1992 to recycle 25% of it's
waste stream. Currently the Village of Williamsville estimated garbage
tonnage for the end of this year will be 3,360 tons. That is based on
tonnage that we pick up per month which is disposed of at the Occidental
Waste and Energy Facility in the Falls. If you take 25% of that, that's
840 tons for the year at our current rate of \$42.62 a ton. That is a
\$35,800 cost avoidance per year by removing the recycled materials.

Mayor Brenton stated Superintendent Laubisch showed us the container
which is blue and white. We intend to use green and white. The color
green is associated with the environment.

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Mayor Brenton also stated that the next meeting you will hear a great deal more about recycling and expenditures because that will be our official budget meeting. In January he issued a solid waste memorandum to the Village Board in which he called out for certain areas to be developed. He assigned those areas to the individual Trustees, the Village Clerk and the Superintendent of Public Works. What has taken place here is that Village Clerk Cummins, Superintendent Laubisch, and Deputy Mayor Kaye have worked diligently from January to date so we can actually enter solid waste recycling. Mayor Brenton complimented them on their efforts. They put a great deal of time into it. He is sure we will be talking more about it in the weeks to come and at our next regularly scheduled meeting.

ON MOTION by Mayor Brenton, seconded by Trustee Kaye, it was moved to suspend rules for public participation.
