The Clerk read the notice of public hearing being held April 23, 1990 at
7:40 P.M. for the purpose of hearing all persons interested in discussing
a Proposed Local Law which would repeal the following existing sections
of the Village Code:

Trustee Sweeney stated this public hearing is being held on a number of
existing local laws which the Village is now proposing to eliminate,
because they are issues that are no longer pertinent to concerns of the
Village. In some cases, the subject matter is covered exclusively in
some sections by other regulations—the State Departmental Quality Review
Requirements, the State of New York public health law and/or the State of
New York uniform Fire Prevention and Building Code. The basic issue is
to expedite the review of the Village Code by eliminating sections that
are no longer serving a useful purpose. Trustee Sweeney asked the
Village Fire Chief, Tony Schueckler, if he has any comments or concerns
regarding those particular sections dealing with the Fire Department,
Fire Prevention, Gasoline and/or Filling Stations.

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Tony Schueckler stated all sections the Village is deleting are covered by our Building Code which is stricter than the old code and run by the New York State Building Code. The Codes the Village is deleting are mostly out of date.

Trustee Sweeney stated a number of the codes do go back to 1958. Some are 1977 and others 1981. For the most part these are older codes.

Mr. Heybusch, 49 Wellington Court, asked, regarding the Aircraft section, if he can no longer land his helicopter.

Trustee Sweeney stated what we are doing is deleting the Aircraft section from the Village Code. Whether Mr. Heybusch lands or not, the Village would have nothing to say about it. That would be governed by the Federal Aviation Administration. Right now that section of the code, enacted in 1958, does specify you couldn't fly lower than 1000 feet. It's an area that the Village would be rather foolish to attempt to enforce.

Mr. Heybusch, stated that what he was really getting at is that there is concern that the airport, for example, is talking about an East/West runway. What is the Village Board's position on that? Are we exerting an influence so that we are not inundated when they start flying the Concord in or something like that?

Trustee Sweeney stated there is nothing now in our Village Code and there is nothing pertinent to this hearing that really addresses the potential expansion or use of the runways at the airport. There are a number of codes such as this section on Aircraft that set a requirement that the Village is ill prepared to enforce. We have no specific proposal to enact any legislation concerning the airport.

ON MOTION by Trustee Sweeney, seconded by Trustee Bindert, it was moved to close the public hearing at 7:56 P.M.

The Clerk read the notice of public hearing being held April 23, 1990 at
7:30 P.M. for the purpose of hearing all persons interested in discussing
a Proposed Local Law which would amend Chapter 17.00-Refuse-by
incorporating recycling provisions.

Trustee Kaye stated that this proposed local law addresses recycling. It
identifies recyclable material as newspaper, corrugated cardboard,
bottles, cans, soft plastics. It also gives the Board the ability to
change the materials if for some reason, at a later date, there are other
items that we can successfully recycle as well as markets develop or if
markets change in terms of the products that we are collecting, that we
have the ability to change the materials by a resolution. The law also
addresses the changes in routine collection and recyclable collection.
Items will be placed in water tight containers or disposable bags and
secured. The weight should not exceed 32 gallons of capacity or weigh
more than 65 lbs. Any premise that, on a regular basis, requires more
than 5 such containers for collection, shall be required to secure a
portable transfer container for the additional amounts over the 5
containers. Those are the basic changes in the law. They do reflect
recycling, also the fact that we would like the garbage and recyclables
placed at the curb before 6:00 A.M. on the day of the scheduled
collection. The Village recently revised the code and made other changes
but these changes primarily just reflect our efforts to move into
recycling on September 1, 1990.

Dick Hill, 18 Brookside Drive, questioned where do you get a water tight
bag with a seal or a disposable bag.

Trustee Kaye stated just a regular garbage can with a lid on it is what
we are talking about or a regular plastic bag that you would buy in a
grocery store. It's probably the same kind as many residents use now.
The Village is not talking about a special kind of container other than
what anyone uses now.

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Henry Heybusch, 49 Wellington Court, asked how many classifications are
being talked about and how many different containers would we be putting
out? Would those be furnished or would we be getting our own?

Trustee Kaye stated David Laubisch, Superintendent of the Department of
Public Works recently met with the managers at Wellington Court primarily
to discuss that question. At this point we have not worked out the
details with Wellington Court and some of the other apartment complexes.
However the individual residents and duplexes will have one recycling bin
that all these recyclable items would be placed into. Residents would
put that out the same day as their garbage collection.

Mr. Heybusch asked if the Village will furnish the bin?

Trustee Kaye stated yes we are. What we are talking about now in this
public hearing is your refuse collection versus recyclables. However
this local law does reflect what recyclables will be.

ON MOTION by Trustee Kaye, seconded by Trustee Bindert, it was moved to
close the public hearing at 7:44 P.M.

The Clerk read the notice of public hearing being held April 23, 1990 for the purpose of hearing all persons interested in discussing the proposal that the Williamsville Train Station located on South Long Street near Lehigh Memory Trail be designated a historical landmark in the Village of Williamsville.

Trustee Kaye stated this public hearing deals with the station on 86 South Long, the railroad station which has had a variety of owners over the years. Trustee Kaye discussed the Historic Preservation Code and it's intent. One of the intents of the Historic Preservation Code is to safeguard the heritage, character and quality of life unique to the Village of Williamsville thru the preservation of landmarks of historic, cultural, social and architectural significance. The Village is looking at designating the railroad station as a historic landmark. The definition of landmark under our Historic Preservation Code is "any structure or sight within the Village of Williamsville which has been designated by the Historic Preservation Commission and approved by the Village Board pursuant to the provisions of Section 5 of this local law." The first owner of the station which we are discussing was the Depew and Tonawanda railroad in 1895, and later included the Lehigh Valley Railroad, Conrail, International Chimney and the present owners which are the Western New York Railroad Society. It's a wonderful building. The Village is thrilled that we have the opportunity to save and preserve this building along with many of the other ones that have received this historical designation, such as the Water Mill, the Castle of Dream Island, the Roneker Building, the Meeting House and Academy School Site which is actually called the Classical Institute Site. The Western New York Railroad Society has been diligently working on the preservation. They have collected data and material and are still looking for pictures of the interior and exterior and are doing a fine job in that preservation of this unique building.

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Tom Stackhouse, Western New York Railroad Historical Society, assured everyone that they are diligently working on the depot to restore it to its 1896 original condition. Their plan for the station, that's been recorded before, is to restore it and open up the waiting room area and the ticket agent's office of the building, as a small museum area. They would have rotating displays that would be changing periodically. The baggage section of the depot will be used for archives which will be used as a Research room. There is electricity in the building right now. Plumbing will eventually be installed. They are hoping to present this building as a real highlight to the Lehigh Memory Trail. As long as Railroad Society members are present we'll make the washroom facilities available to anyone out on the trail, when they are installed. They will be having the building open on a regular basis once it is restored. The building will be open this Sunday from 1:00 P.M. to 4:00 P.M. They welcome everyone to come in and take a look. There's alot of work to be done and it's going to take alot of manpower and materials. They certainly wouldn't turn away any money either. They are actively soliciting contractors that would like to put in bids on the building as far as restoration work is concerned. This would give them a target to go out and raise funds for specific items. They welcome everyone to come out and see them on Sunday and for any work parties.

Trustee Daniels questioned the designation of the different levels of designation. Would there be a national prospect? Usually on higher levels, there is funding available.

Mr. Stackhouse stated it is local, then state and then national. He will look into higher designation. More than likely it would be to their advantage to try for high level since the higher you go, the more credibility they would receive. They're definitely willing to apply for any type of funds. Anyone who can give them any help on applying for grants, please come forward.

ON MOTION by Trustee Kaye, seconded by Trustee Sweeney, it was moved to close the public hearing at 7:50 P.M.

Mayor Brenton stated his ninth resolution deals with his previous report
indicating that we have received an application for a road cut permit
which is required under local law. This application is from Ciminelli
Development Corporation. There has been a matter of controversy
regarding this road over the last 2 years. The situation has gone into
litigation. Supreme Court Justice Doyle has indicated that the developer
should apply to the Village Board for the required permit. The Village
had previously agreed if the developer did apply for the permit to handle
the matter in an expedited fashion. We intend to do so to the best of
our ability. In order to start that process, we are calling for a public
hearing to discuss the application of the Ciminelli Corporation.

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ON MOTION by Mayor Brenton, seconded by Trustee Daniels, the following
resolution was hereby adopted:

Mayor Brenton stated his tenth resolution deals with the continuation of

north side of Main Street. This includes the brick pavers, the grates
around the trees and unfortunately, the guards around the trees also. We
intend, with the exception of the guards, to duplicate the project on the
south side of Main Street this year.

resolution was hereby adopted:

resolution was hereby adopted:

Trustee Daniels announced that 2 programs are coming up this week at the
Meeting House. The first one is tomorrow evening. It's a classic jazz
with the Galliard Brass Quintet and accompanying them will be a jazz
trio, guitar, bass and drums. The selections are from Duke Ellington,
Chuck Mangione, Lennon & McCartney. It's a varied affair. The price is
\$5.00 for adults, \$3.00 for seniors and students and that includes a
reception at intermission.

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On Friday and Saturday night of the same week we have the Amherst Players
doing 2 scenes from the play "Lovers and Other Strangers".

ON MOTION by Trustee Daniels, seconded by Trustee Bindert, the following
resolution was hereby adopted:

WHEREAS the Village of Williamsville has advertised
for sealed bids for 1990 Glen Park Security, and

WHEREAS Burns International, 1491 Sheridan Drive,
Kenmore, New York, submitted their low bid of \$6.32 per
hour which met all specifications,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the contract
for 1990 Glen Park Security is hereby awarded to Burns
International for their low bid of \$6.32 per hour.

Trustee Bindert stated he was very happy we were able to obtain a bid in
this price range for the Glen Park Committee. He had been Liaison to
this committee last year as well as several years prior to that. When we
bid the security the first time the Village was faced with the escalation
in costs that would increase the costs about 50%. In rejecting the first
bid and rebidding, we were able to save that committee about \$3,000 or
\$4,000. If you are talking a total budget of \$34-35,000, that is a
considerable amount of money that could be well used to facilitate Glen
Park which is really used by quite a few people in the whole area.

Unanimously carried.

Trustee Kaye reported that the Village of Williamsville is going to
celebrate Earth Day on Sunday, April 29th rather than this past Sunday.
There were so many events happening this past Sunday that we wanted to
make sure that everyone had the opportunity to participate in our
activities, also realizing that Earth Day isn't just one day, but it's a
real frame of mind. At Lehigh Memory Trail this coming Sunday the 29th,
from 1 P.M. to 4 P.M., the Village will be giving trees away. There will
be a tree planting, a variety of displays, a raffle for a globe of the
earth, group walks. One which will be done by Earth Watch will take
children and adults through the park and point out a variety of different
species of plants and animals and birds that are there along the trail.
Trustee Kaye thanked the Environmental Committee and Youth Committee,
Parks Committee and Beatification Committee for all of their help in
putting this program together. We welcome everyone to come out and as
you heard earlier from Tom Stackhouse of the Western New York Railroad
Historical Society, that the Lehigh Railroad station will be open also so
that you can tour that facility from 1 P.M. to 4 P.M. on this coming
Sunday.

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Trustee Kaye stated her first resolution is to award the contract for
Parks security. This is for all the other parks in the Village other
than Glen Park which Trustee Daniels just spoke about. The award is
going to the same company, Burns International, for their low bid as
well.

ON MOTION by Trustee Kaye, seconded by Trustee Bindert, the following
resolution was hereby adopted:

WHEREAS the Village of Williamsville has advertised
for sealed bids for 1990 Village Park Security, and

WHEREAS Burns International, 1491 Sheridan Drive,
Kenmore, New York, submitted their low bid of \$6.32 per
hour which met all specifications,

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the contract
for 1990 Village Park Security is hereby awarded to
Burns International for their low bid of \$6.32 per hour.

Unanimously carried.

Trustee Kaye stated the Park's Department is also saving a considerable
amount of money from the previous bid that had been submitted.

Trustee Kaye stated her second resolution deals with a change order for
Lehigh Memory Trail that deals with some additional safety surfacing
under several of the stations.

ON MOTION by Trustee Kaye, seconded by Trustee Bindert, the following
resolution was hereby adopted:

RESOLVED THAT Change Order #3 is hereby approved
between the Village of Williamsville and Great Lakes
Landscaping, Inc. for the Landscaping of the Lehigh
Memory Trail.

1. Additional installation of 200 square yards of
Fibar-Felt Geotextile Fabric and 1800 square feet
of Fibar Wood Fiber for increasing the surface area
of fibar at exercise station nos. 3, 4, 6, 7, and 8.

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2. Additional excavation and NYSDOT No. 1 Crushed
Stone, Bid Item No. 6 (Alternate No. 1) shall also
be provided for the installation of the fiber
material. \$ 500.00 increase

Trustee Sweeney reminded everyone that previously he called for a public
hearing to be held on May 14th concerning the proposed elimination of the
high rise zoning classification R-4, reclassification of those properties
currently zoned R-4 to R-3M. That's a public hearing to be held May 14th
which is the next regular Board meeting.

Trustee Sweeney stated his first resolution concerns a proposed rezoning
resulting from a petition received by the Village Board back on January
15th from property owners on Reist and Glen Street requesting
reclassification of their property from a commercial category C-2 to
residential R-3. Their petition was the subject of a public hearing and
was submitted to the Environmental, Traffic and Safety and Planning
Boards for recommendations.

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ON MOTION by Trustee Sweeney, seconded by Trustee Bindert, the following resolution was hereby adopted:

RESOLVED THAT the following area, which was the subject of a public hearing on March 26, 1990, is hereby rezoned from C-2 to R-3:
