In the absence of Mayor Brenton, Deputy Mayor Yvonne Kaye called the meeting to order with the Pledge of Allegiance at 7:32 P.M.

ON MOTION by Deputy Mayor Kaye, seconded by Trustee Sweeney, the minutes of the public hearing of the Board of Trustees regarding use of 1991-1991 Community Development Funds held February 11, 1991 were approved.

ON MOTION by Deputy Mayor Kaye, seconded by Trustee Sweeney, the minutes of the public hearing of the Board of Trustees regarding a proposed local law - repeal existing Chapter 50.00 - Sidewalks and Street and adopt new Chapter 50.00 - Streets & Sidewalks held February 11, 1991 were approved.

Unanimously carried.

Deputy Mayor Kaye stated Mayor Brenton's next resolution is a request for state revenue sharing reinstatement. Village Clerk/Treasurer Theresa Cummins will be attending meetings in Albany tomorrow as our representative from the Village of Williamsville. A resolution was passed at our last meeting authorizing Mrs. Cummins, along with representatives from 23 other municipalities, to meet with the Senate Local Government Committee and Assembly Local Government Committee during the day and in the evening. The Erie County representatives have invited local legislators to talk about reinstatement of funds that are being proposed to be lost to us.

Deputy Mayor Kaye stated on a good note, the Erie County Village Officials Association has agreed to pay for Clerk Theresa Cummins' transportation along with the other members of Village officials who are going from this area. We will not be incurring transportation costs as we initially thought. Deputy Mayor Kaye read the resolution which Clerk Cummins will take with her. We will also be sending copies of it to the appropriate noted people requesting the reinstatement of state funds.

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ON MOTION by Deputy Mayor Kaye, seconded by Trustee Bindert, the following resolution was hereby adopted:

WHEREAS Governor Cuomo has recommended drastic cuts in state aid, and,

WHEREAS these cuts amount to nothing more than a shift of the state deficit to local property taxes, and,

WHEREAS local governments must provide essential public services and cannot abandon the health and safety of their residents, and,

WHEREAS the magnitude of such reductions will cause significant reductions in services plus potential large tax increases,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Village of Williamsville Board of Trustees call upon Senator John B. Sheffer, II, and Assemblyman Richard Anderson to stand up for our taxpayers by rejecting the Governor's proposal, and return state revenue sharing to its 1990-91 level, and

FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this resolution be sent to Senator John B. Sheffer, II, Assemblyman Richard Anderson, Governor Mario Cuomo, Senator Ralph Marino, Speaker Mel Miller, the New York Conference of Mayors, the Buffalo News, and the Amherst Bee.

Unanimously carried.

Trustee Bindert had no report or resolutions this evening.

Clerk Cummins read a report from Trustee Daniels in his absence.

"I am very sorry that I am not able to attend the Williamsville Village Board meeting tonight. At the last minute, I was able to rearrange my work schedule so that I can attend the New York State Conference of Mayors meeting in Albany today and tomorrow. Over 160 Mayors and village officials are in attendance. Several extremely important issues will be discussed at this conference, and I feel that it is imperative for an elected government official from the Village of Williamsville to be in attendance today. Three sessions that I will concentrate on today concern the ominous State deficit and resulting burden it places on the tax rate for the Village of Williamsville, cuts in our senior citizen programs, and the Firefighter's Service Awards Program. I look forward to reporting to the rest of the Village Board, along with Clerk Cummins, upon my return.

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Tonight, I am also requesting that the Village Board look favorably upon my request to wave the normal Meeting House rental fee for an event occurring February 28, at 7:30 pm. At that time the Village will be honored to host the first annual Erie County Environmental Council Awards Reception. This year's award recipients are:

The David Bigelow Award for Environmental Education, presented to Walter Simpson, Program Director for the Conserve U.B. Energy Conservation Program.

The Harold Dodge Award for Distinguished Contribution to Environmental Preservation, presented to Karen Blake for public education on pesticide dangers and alternatives to pesticides.

Environmental Reporting Award, presented to WNED/WNEQ-TV for Operation Earth: Year of the Environment.

Professional Environmental Educator Award, presented Peter A. Mirando, for the Environmental Science Program at Hamburg Senior High School.

Environmental Protection Program Award, presented to Russell Lis, Instructor at McKinley High School/NYSDEC Deercheck Cooperative Program.

The Honorable John B. Sheffer, II, New York State Senator from the Sixtieth Senatorial District will offer brief comments on the prospects for environmental legislation in 1991. The presentation will be made by the Honorable Dennis T. Gorski, Erie County Executive.

Over 90 environmental groups have been invited, and I'm requesting that our Williamsville Environmental Council meeting commence at 6:30 that night, so that they may complete their agenda early and attend."

Trustee Sweeney stated he has recommended that an amendment be made to Trustee Daniels' resolution concerning waiving fees when some question was raised regarding the appropriateness of the resolution. Basically, it is Trustee Sweeney's belief that the fee is set by the Meeting House Committee; therefore, it would be inappropriate for the Village Board to waive it.

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ON MOTION by Trustee Daniels, seconded by Trustee Bindert, the following resolution was hereby adopted:

WHEREAS the Erie County Environmental Management Council is having its First Annual Awards Reception honoring five areas of exception environmental achievement at the Village Meeting House on February 28, 1991 at 7:30 P.M.,

BE IT RESOLVED that as a gesture of support and recognition of the honor of hosting this prestigious event, any appropriate fees not to exceed \$35.00 shall be paid from the Village Environmental Advisory Council Budget.

Deputy Mayor Kaye commented that there is a standard set fee that we do have to pay as the Village for the opening and closing of that facility. We do employ Eleanor Masters to open and close the Meeting House. She feels it is important that we do have a budget to take this money out of it to actually pay it.

Unanimously carried.

Deputy Mayor Kaye reported she is very pleased that Clerk/Treasurer Cummins, who has been with the Village for many years, is going to go to Albany to represent us. She has a tremendous financial background and history of the Village needs and exactly where monies need to go and where to come from and to protect our Village from having those drastic cutbacks as are proposed.

Deputy Mayor Kaye reported the recycling will start the week of March 19 on your garbage day. This is the actual guide to recycling that residents will be receiving in the mail along with a letter from Mayor Brenton. It outlines exactly what to recycle, the do's and the don'ts and the when, where and questions. So residents should be receiving it on Wednesday of this week. Also, there will be a notice in the Amherst Bee that will remind Village residents to come and pick up their boxes on the appropriate dates - Saturday March 2, Sunday, March 3, and Wednesday March 6. The dates and times are in the letter. It is her understanding from the Fire Company we already had some people come last week to try to pick up their recycling bins. There will be several activities happening on March 2nd as well. BFI will bring Biffy Bear for the children and we'll have face painting by the Amherst Youth Committee. There will be a variety of gifts that are made of recycled products which will be handed out by BFI. Deputy Mayor Kaye also pointed out that BFI, who will pick up our recyclable products, did pay for the printing of the flyers for our initial mailing.

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Deputy Mayor Kaye reported she has gotten several calls in the last couple of days and she wanted to clarify some information about 2 projects to which she is liaison. One is Lehigh Memory Trail and one is the Pavilion. There seems to be some confusion in the community about the actual cost estimate and the actual final cost of those projects. In 1987, the Pavilion was proposed to be \$150,700 plus the design fees and the actual cost upon completion came in at \$138,000. That also does not take out the \$50,000 grant that was received nor the \$12,000 which was donated by the Jolly Boys for that structure. In terms of Lehigh Memory Trail, there were a few cost estimates along the way depending on the changes that were made. In 1988 there was a cost estimate which was approximately \$156,000 and in 1989 there was a cost estimate, both of these from URS Consulting, of \$183,000. The actual cost of that project was \$138,810. There was an \$80,000 grant received for that project. Both of those projects did come in under the original proposed cost.

Deputy Mayor Kaye also reported there are some questions she received about the water usage the weekend of the Youth Committee winterfest in terms of filling up one of the ponds at Glen Park for ice skating. She is sorry Trustee Daniels is not here this evening. The questions that have come to her were primarily who was going to pay for the 1500 gallons of water that was pumped into the pond. Deputy Mayor Kaye thought that was a very good question since that had not been brought up to the Board in advance. It went through and dissipated through the ground so actually no ice skating could take place because the water had not stayed there. That is a question that still remains as who is actually going to pay for that water since it was not a requested budgetary item, and there is not a line item for that expenditure.

Trustee Sweeney stated his resolution reflects the result from the couple of public hearings that were held at the last meeting. Several people in the audience last time did make very good and appropriate comments concerning additions to our Sidewalk and Street Code. As a result of their comments, he sat down with the Code Review Committee another time and went over those points to see that we were satisfied that we had an enforceable and desirable code and that we had achieved our objectives. These were to streamline existing requirements and to set forth conditions that would result in Village control of Village property and at the same time give this Board and future Boards some latitude in the enforcement and/or discretion in certain areas of those codes.

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ON MOTION by Trustee Sweeney, seconded by Trustee Bindert, the following resolution was hereby adopted:

RESOLVED THAT existing Section 50.00 of the Village Code entitled "Sidewalks and Streets" and Section 58.00 entitled, "Plowing of Snow by Private Snowplow Operators," which were the subject of public hearings on February 11, 1991, are hereby repealed, and,

FURTHER RESOLVED that Chapter 50.00 of the Village Code, entitled "Streets and Sidewalks," including Sections 50.01 through 50.12, which was the subject of a public hearing on February 11, 1991, is hereby adopted, as amended, by Local Law #4-1991.

Unanimously carried.

Deputy Mayor Kaye stated that in the absence of Superintendent David Laubisch, she wanted to remind residents that anyone who has any kind of trash to be picked up, the Village is not in the regular part of our trash pickup. However, if there is something that needs to be picked up, residents can call Village Hall at 632-4120. They are compiling a list and on Fridays, the DPW is going out to those particular locations to pick up any trash that residents may have.

ON MOTION by Deputy Mayor Kaye, seconded by Trustee Sweeney, it was moved to suspend the rules for the purpose of public participation.

Unanimously carried.

Mary Lowther, 120 N. Ellicott, stated she was at the Board meeting 2 weeks ago when Mrs. Cummins was authorized to go the meeting, the Mayor's Conference. She doesn't recall anybody else being authorized by the Village to attend that meeting. She understands Trustee Daniels is at the meeting. Has he been authorized by the Village to act on behalf of the Village of Williamsville at the meeting? Ms. Lowther stated the Board has authorized expenditure of funds for our Village Clerk to attend. Has that happened with Trustee Daniels?

Deputy Mayor Kaye stated Trustee Daniels has not requested that a resolution be passed nor has he requested any authority to expend funds.

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Mary Lowther said the Village needs a podium for speakers from the audience. When you come up here and you're going to discuss something that involves tax and figures, you need somewhere to set your material. Several speakers have had a hard time checking their notes since we have had this wonderful new sound system installed.

Deputy Mayor Kaye thanked her and stated it was a very good point.

Bob Krieter, 62 Eagle Street, stated at the last meeting there was some discussion on the new local law and he wondered if there was any conference regarding the questions discussed.

Trustee Sweeney stated yes, there was a follow up meeting of the Code Review Committee. The possibility of changes was reviewed, but in fact, the code as proposed is what we agreed really did meet the objectives that we started with. Therefore, the code that was enacted tonight was the same wording that was discussed at the hearing. There was a minor change in one definition and one section that was deleted.

Bob Krieter asked what consideration, if any, was given to using 6x6's or whatever terminology we used in place of what is there now?

Trustee Sweeney stated the basic problem is that any temporary curb or obstruction in the Village right-of-way presents an opportunity to be struck by a passenger, someone riding a bike and/or causes a problem for the Village snowplow crew. In order to avoid the possibility of causing damage to these temporary structures that won't withstand the force of a plow and/or may result in a hazard to bicyclists or joggers, it is simply not advisable for the Village to enact a code that allows individuals to put obstructions on the public thoroughfare.

Bob Krieter asked if there is an alternative?

Trustee Sweeney stated the alternative is that we did leave wording in that section that gives a homeowner or property owner the right to petition the Village Board for approval of such structures. His own consistent thought is that he would not vote to approve an application for that kind of a structure because of the problems it presents. But the local law does provide that as an option so this Board or future Boards may view an individual instance or several cases where the problems would not exist, that there would be a benefit without a hazard.

Bob Krieter asked if a homeowner could install curbing. Is that a possibility?

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Trustee Sweeney stated the local law that we passed would make that possible. The homeowner or property owner would have to apply to the Village Board, not the Building Department, for approval to do that. We could approve it. It's all possible but at the same time his feeling is that it would be unlikely that would, or that he would, vote in favor of such an approval. The basic point is, if someone were to propose at their own expense constructing a substantial and safe curb, he would have no objection.

Arnold Jerome, 153 Arend Ave, stated he has lived in the Village for 41 years and he loves it. He also loves the Town of Amherst. He was a Safety Engineer for an insurance company and Industrial Hygienist and Chemist for 28 years. The first 15 years of his experience was doing safety surveys of municipalities all over the state of New York from Erie County to the middle of Long Island. He would look at roads and conditions of buildings. Right now he thinks we have a problem with too much salt on our streets and highways in the Village of Williamsville and the Town of Amherst. Just about 9 people out of 10 that he has talked to about this think the same thing that he does, that there is too much salt, which is destroying the highways. It's destroying bridges. The state is in a billion dollars of debt to reconstruct bridges and highways. He has a letter that was written to Patrick Lucey, the Town Highway Superintendent. He tried to get his attention here a week or so ago but he was busy. This letter covers what he wanted to talk about. Mr. Lucey talks about the amount of salt being used in the Town of Amherst. "For your information, we maintain about 680 lane miles of roads in the Town of Amherst. Our average consumption of salt is 14,000 tons per winter season, for a per lane use of 20.6 tons, every lane on the highway. This is considerably less than the usage noted in your attached newspaper article. The city of Rochester works on 1,074 lane miles of roads and averages 22,500 tons of salt per winter season for a per lane use of 21 tons." That's very close to the Town of Amherst. They justify the use of the salt by saying that a light snowfall is the most dangerous one of all from the standpoint of ice potential. "Unfortunately, we receive all too many of these 1/2" to 2" falls of snow which turn to ice as the traffic begins on the roads. Often times parts of streets are bare while others are snow covered and it is not possible to apply salt only to the snow covered portion". They talk about the Village of Williamsville as a large percentage of elderly people and a large percentage of young people who are drivers whose reaction time is slowed down. If the roads are not in very safe condition, they could have accidents. They could die from injuries or kill other people. What they overlook is the fact of what it's costing the public highways and bridges because of the overuse of salt.

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He has talked to 6 highway engineers and superintendents and 2 scientists from Calspan and they all agree with him that some towns are going overboard with salt. He is interested in any Board member's opinion in this subject.

Trustee Bindert stated it is kind of interesting because this morning, there was just a light snow on the ground. At approximately 8:00 A.M., he went down North Union, just leaving the Village which was a little slick. Trustee Bindert didn't think it was bad and he didn't feel that the salt trucks had gone through there yet. He saw cars coming up awfully slow, about 10 mph, and he couldn't figure out why because the conditions didn't warrant the speed. A little bit further there were 3 cars in the ditch. Trustee Bindert agrees with what Mr. Jerome says about salt deteriorating the roads, the bridges and everything. On the other hand, if you were stuck in the ditch because they didn't salt that road, you would think a little bit differently.

Mr. Jerome stated that in the New England states, in the winter time, they use cinders and sands. Also, some of the towns use salt mixed with these items, but they also use them only on areas where there are boulevard stop signs and signals. They don't spread them all over the lengths of the streets. He came up to the Meeting House a week ago Friday evening to hear the Banjo Pickers concert and the streets were just saturated with salt and slush. In fact the traffic going up Mill Street was throwing this slush up on the sidewalk.

Trustee Bindert stated he thinks primarily what they have a tendency to do is in the rural areas is to use a mixture of salt and cinders but in a municipal area where there is a large concentration, there is a down side with using cinders because of the objections of them getting into your lawn and ruining your grass. Over a period of years the salt does run away with the water. Cinders are going to be there, not that they are not going to move a little bit but they will primarily be there. Everything is really a tradeoff.

Bob Krieter asked Mr. Jerome if the salt would deteriorate the asphalt also.

Mr. Jerome stated it also destroys asphalt but not as fast as concrete.

Deputy Mayor Kaye asked if Mr. Jerome has a proposal for the Village in terms of what he would like to see the Village do.

Mr. Jerome stated he would like to see the amount of salt used in the Village compared with the Town of Amherst.

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Deputy Mayor Kaye stated Superintendent Laubisch unfortunately isn't here tonight. He would really be the expert who would be able to give you those figures right away. What we can do is have Superintendent Laubisch contact you and give you information you desire.

ON MOTION by Deputy Mayor Kaye, seconded by Trustee Sweeney, it was moved to return to the regular agenda.

Unanimously carried.

ON MOTION by Trustee Sweeney, seconded by Trustee Bindert, it was moved to adjourn at 8:10 P.M.
